

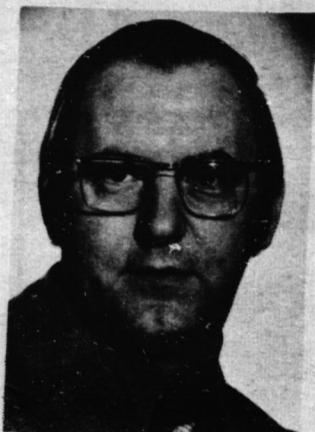
Federation Criticizes CAC Spending

The way the Consumers' Association of Canada plans to spend its \$250,000 in government grants is criticized by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

"We need a consumer watchdog, but one to educate consumers -- not confuse them," says Grace Stalker, OFA executive member from Bath.

Receives Degree



Rev. J. Douglas Schwyer, pastor at Redeemer Lutheran Church, St. Thomas, Ontario, received the degree of Master of Sacred Theology at recent convocation ceremonies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. Mr. Schwyer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Schwyer of R. R. 3, Jarvis. He received his high school training at Cayuga and Hagersville Secondary Schools graduating with the Honour Diploma in 1957. In 1961 he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts from Concordia Senior College, Ft. Wayne, Indiana and in 1965 he earned the Bachelor of Divinity degree from the seminary in St. Louis. The Master of Sacred Theology degree is conferred on one who has "acquired a specialized knowledge in a field of theological learning" and has demonstrated "skills in using effectively the tools and results of the theological research" by completing the course requirements and the presentation of an acceptable thesis. Mr. Schwyer earned the degree by completing the course and thesis while serving in the full-time pastoral ministry first in Sudbury and for the past two years in St. Thomas. His thesis on the History and Development of Religious Education in Ontario Schools is to become a part of the curriculum at the Seminary in St. Louis. Mr. Schwyer is married to Joyce nee Breitman, formerly of Cascade, Wisconsin. They have four children.

in Ottawa. "When CAC President Maryon Brechin earmarks a large part of this grant for fighting marketing boards, she does a disservice to her members."

Mrs. Stalker refused Mrs. Brechin's claims that marketing boards have artificially pushed the cost of eggs, milk, and broiler chickens too high. "Farmers are aware that the price to the consumer is up. But is the consumer aware how long -- how unbearably long -- the price to the farmer was down below the cost of production?"

"The Consumers' Association would be worth its salt if it explained what goes on between the farm and the dinner table."

Mrs. Stalker, an egg producer herself, adds, "Between March, 1970 and June, 1972 when the egg board was given the power to set prices, eggmen lost between 50¢ and \$2 a bird. The producing side of the industry lost \$20-million last year. Farmers received as little as 17¢ a dozen when it cost 32¢ a dozen to produce eggs."

Canon Richardson will continue as Rector of St. Stephen's, Niagara Falls and the Brock Memorial Church of St. Saviour, Queenston.

On Saturday, May 26, 1973, members of Community Baptist Church, Balmoral, united with friends from sister churches of the Fellowship of Evangelical Baptist Churches for the purpose of setting aside their pastor, Mr. E. D. Baker, for the gospel ministry in an ordination service.

The congregation assembled at 10 a.m. at which time the business was conducted.

Mr. Baker then proceeded with his three-fold statement of Faith. He related that through the faithfulness and determination of his Sunday School teacher, he was brought to the realization of his lost condition and accepted Jesus Christ as his Saviour at the age of nine years. In 1954 he heard God's call to the ministry and he attended London College of Bible and Missions graduating in 1963. He accredited his ability to graduate to a praying Grandmother and God's answer to her prayers. His grandmother came from Balmoral and Mr. Baker feels God has led him back home.

Mr. Baker stated that he believes all sixty-six books of the Bible to be a complete and final revelation of God. God created all things and if we are not glorifying God in all things there is something wrong in our relation-

ship with Him. Following this statement, a question period was granted the council. Mr. Baker ably answered these questions. The congregation then adjourned to the basement where a buffet dinner was enjoyed by all.

The ordination service commenced at 2 p.m. with scripture readings, Acts 13:2-4, and the ordination prayer by Rev. Fred Howard. Rev. Ron Baxter gave the charge to the candidate and Mr. Ray Watts the charge to the church.

Rev. David Irwin gave a stirring message to all. He likened our lives to photography. Negatives must be held to the light to produce the positive. The disciple Peter was like this - (a) too much self-confidence; (b) too little prayer; (c) too many personal plans; (d) too little thinking of the Word of God. When the word of God increased - the church multiplied. Stewarts of the Gospel -- man in charge of the house (family) of his master. God is our Master and His word our instruction. We must not substitute, subtract or add to the Word of God.

Positive -- a people united together in all they seek to do and doing it according to God's will.

After the singing of a hymn Rev. E. D. Baker closed in prayer.
