

## Transmission Route

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The trailer will be parked at the Jarvis Community Centre and will be open to the people of the area on Tuesday, from noon to 8:00 p.m. and Wednesday, from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

"It is essential that Ontario Hydro obtain as many views as possible, so our centre is to be a two-way street. We will give the information that we have in the hope that local people will express their concerns and ideas. These views are most important in determining the best route and need to be included in our environmental analysis," he said.

**Why This Approach?**  
The three generating

stations and the proposed transmission line are essential to meet future provincial needs, Mr. Hendry said.

This type of planning depends on public participation. Even with the full exchange of information and opinions, perfect solutions are rare but with public participation, Ontario Hydro hopes the effects of the proposed transmission lines will be minimal.

"The task facing us all is to determine a route for the lines which will protect the environment and property interests in this area and will ensure a reliable supply of electricity to everyone," Mr. Hendry said.

Mr. C. Einwechter, caretaker at the school, alerted police when he heard the sound of glass breaking from his home across the road.

The rash of break-ins in the school system has prompted the Hamilton Board of Education to send out directives to all schools stating that no money is to remain in the schools overnight.

the scales further in favor of the employed professional."

He noted that the recent report of the Premier's energy advisor, Darcy McKeough, specified a new government structure to design, co-ordinate and maintain a provincial energy policy, involving Ontario Hydro and other energy systems.

"It is part of the OMEA's role to ensure this policy does not degenerate into government interference, but remains as broad guidelines for Ontario Hydro to function for the benefit of the municipalities and local consumers," he said.

There is a need to increase public understanding about Ontario Hydro matters, he

added. The OMEA and others must ensure that Hydro's work and needs are understood and that "the viewpoints of a vocal minority are not interpreted as the will of the majority."

At present, the public is "kept in control" of Ontario Hydro because elected municipal commissioners act as trustees of Hydro on the public's behalf.

"You have dictatorship without recourse unless you have these trustees," he said.

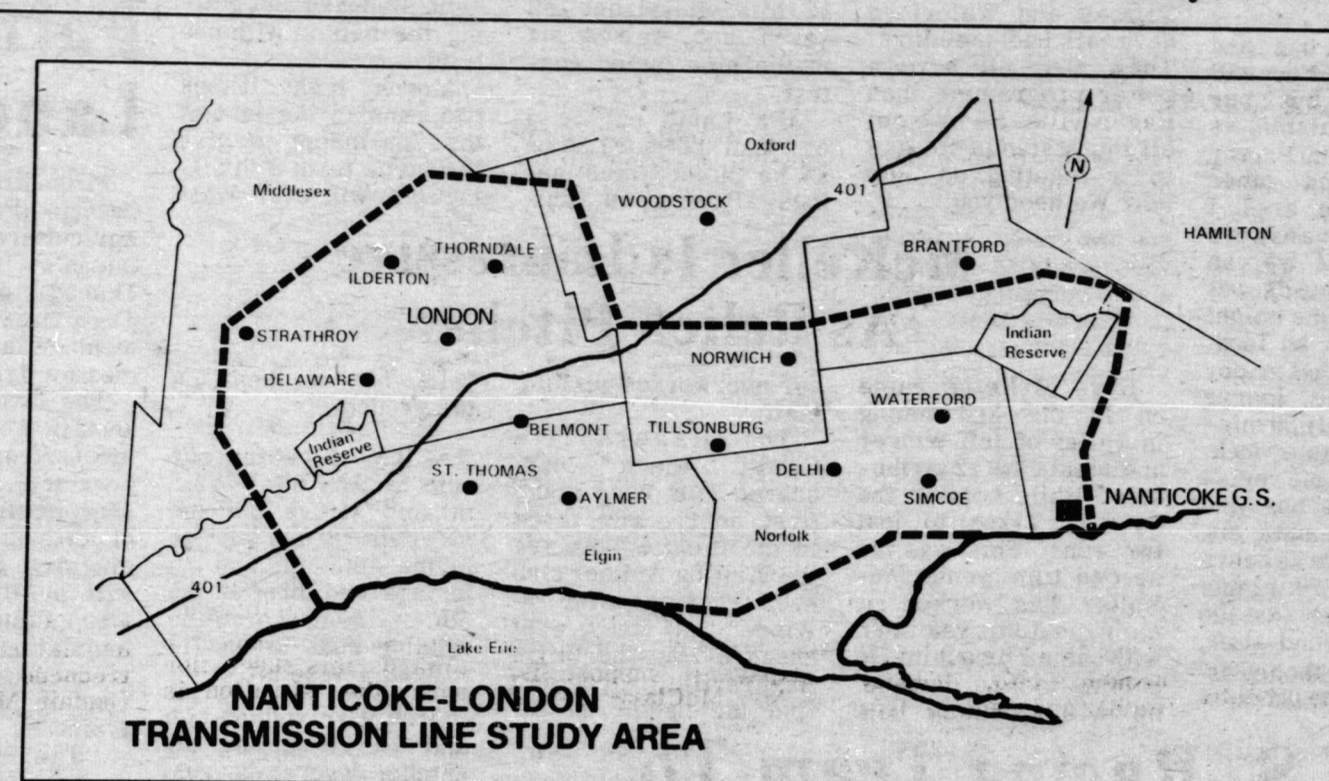

## Power to live by

Demands for electricity continue to increase as our standard of living rises and the economy expands. No less important than the generating stations that will satisfy these demands are the transmission lines which will carry the power to the customer.

Major transmission lines will be required to serve farms, communities and industries in this area and we believe that you should take an active part in the planning of these facilities.

In the near future, we must start building 500,000-volt lines to carry electricity from Nanticoke generating station, on Lake Erie, to the London area to form an integral part of the power network.
