Reciprocal Borrowing Is Now In Effect

As of July 1, any person who is the holder of a library card from any library in the Niagara Regional Library System will have the privilege of borrowing books from any of the other member libraries.

In this area, people from Hagersville will be affected. Anyone who is presently a member of the Hagersville Public Library may now obtain a membership card. This card will extend borrowing privileges at such libraries as Walpole-Rainham in Selkirk, Caledonia Public Library and Cayuga Public Library, Even St. Catharines Public Library will be included, if there is a reason for a borrower to be that far away from home.

It is anticipated that not too many people will take advantage of this new service, in view of the ease in ordering books through the Inter-library Loan Service. However, there are individuals whose place of residence and job location are quite far apart,

and using the home library is sometimes inconvenient.

Some of us, too, are impatient about waiting for a book to come by the Regional delivery service.

Books that are borrowed from any library within the library system may be returned to any other library in the system. It is important that the borrower check the rules of the library he is using. These rules do differ from one library to another.
