

O.P.P. Report

On June 17, 1973, the Cayuga Auto Service, located on Highway No. 3 just east of Cayuga, in North Cayuga Township, was entered and one Donald Desrochers of 589 Barton St., Stoney Creek, Ontario, was arrested within the building. This investigation led to the recovery of over \$6,000.00 of stolen property from nine such occurrences from this area to London, Ontario. Prov. Const. W. L. Eves investigated. Prov. Cons. W. L. Eves, Cayuga Detachment, is investigating the theft of car parts from a 1968 model, including a red Camaro hood, grille and front bumper. Norfolk Group Plans Regional Art Centre

For some months a group of Norfolk County citizens have been attempting to arrange for the purchase and restoration of Lynnwood, the historic Simcoe home of Duncan Campbell - one of Norfolk County's most prominent men in the 1800's.

Lynnwood will become an art centre, providing a focal point for a rounded program in various facets of the visual, musical and literary arts. Space would be available to stage art and craft exhibitions that could be displayed in attractive surroundings.

In January 1973, Lynnwood was declared a Historic Site of national significance by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada.

The most significant recent development is the announcement by the Ontario Heritage Foundation of a pledge of up to \$50,000.00 for the historic restoration of the Campbell house. The Foundation has also encouraged the adaptive use of the facilities as an art gallery. This grant is subject to the Lynnwood Arts Centre's acquiring the property without debt, and also subject to the remainder of the total funding being located. The Foundation considers the preserva-

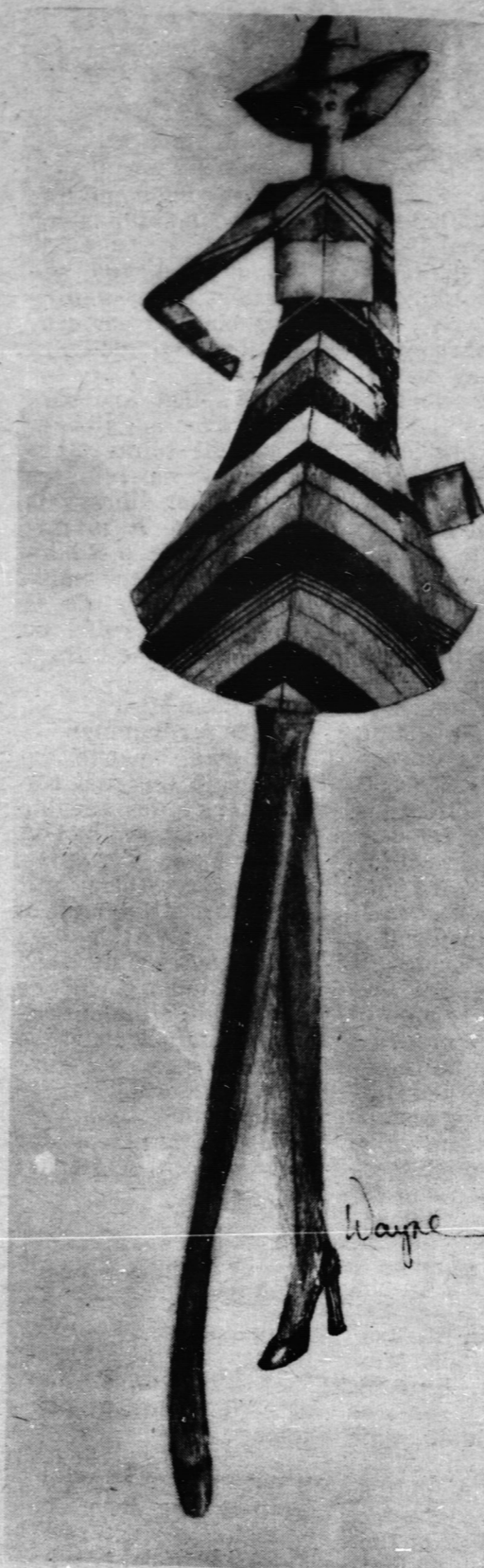
