Hall - \$1,500; Cheapside Community Hall - \$800; County of Haldimand - \$166,520.14; Long Point Conservation Authority - \$4,095; Ontario Federation of Agriculture, Haldimand Branch - \$1,250.

Council approved \$400 to be given to the Selkirk Volunteer Fire Department for clothing and a further \$400 to be paid to the Selkirk Volunteer Fire Service Club expense account. Deputy-reeve Bruce Meehan noted that council receives very cheap fire service from this group because they raise a lot of their own money.

Council approved a pay hike for the Committee of Adjustment, Planning Board and Fence Viewers. In 1972, these employees of the township received \$15 per meeting and 12 cents a mile mileage. This has been raised to \$20 per meeting and 15 cents per mile.

Council members "were the only ones who didn't get a raise this year" - except for a few pennies in mileage. They will continue to receive \$30 per meeting and the Reeve will receive an additional \$200 honorarium. Mileage was raised to 15 cents from 12 cents per mile.

The road department wage scale was approved as follows: operators - \$3.20 per hr.; foreman - \$3.45 per hr.; labourers - \$2.55 per hr.; secretary - \$105 per week; road superintendent - \$8,500 per annum. Additional salaries approved were: clerk - \$10,500; secretary - \$5,200.

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A year of service in the community, schools for leaders, workshops, a variety of programs and a study of Africa was revealed in the annual reports. Community action included assistance in establishing a medical centre, helping the Children's Aid with Homemaking classes, helping with handicapped children and the Red Cross Meals on Wheels program. Some churches provided room for the Health Unit to hold Mothers' Morning out meetings and U.C.W. members babysat so the mothers could relax. Many had programs for senior citizens, such as entertainment and outings. Many visits and treats were recorded for sick and shut-ins.

The speaker for the afternoon, Rev. R. C. Plant, associate secretary of the Division of Communications of the United Church of Canada was introduced by Miss Leona Douglas, Cayuga. He commended the U.C.W. of Erie Presbyterian for their contribution to missions, both financially and spiritually. He said that Live Love projects had increased 33% during January and February of this year.

Referring to conditions in India, Mr. Plant spoke of the excellent work the missionaries, sponsored by Canadians, are doing in that country. He quoted Dr. Eva Moses, superintendent of Indore Christian Hospital as saying "There is no power to change life in India greater than Jesus Christ."

He said it will only be a short time until missionaries will not be needed in Trinidad. "The Church of Trinidad will go it alone."

In Africa, by the year 2000, there will be more Christians per capita than Canada and they may be sending missionaries to Canada. We must not be self-righteous. Japan requested 50 Christian high school teachers but we haven't 50 Christian high school teachers to send them.

He paid tribute to Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Strachan who have been recognized by the Brazilian government for their work in agriculture and are helping with information needed to promote human economic development in Parane. People abroad will be looking at Canadian travellers to see how they reflect their love for Christ.

Mrs. Grace Baldwin, Cayuga thanked the speaker for his fine address.

Young Jim Nagel, who could still play Bantam hockey, put on one of the finest performances seen by a lot of hockey fans and scored three goals and picked up two assists for a five point night in a crucial game.

The game wasn't even a minute old when Nagel drew the Delhi goalie out of the net and fed the puck to Terry Fryett who had the whole side of the net to shoot at. Rene DePooter was in the right place at the right time and pushed the puck under a sprawling Kirk Brown to tie the game at 1-1.

Glen Hewson and Fryett worked the puck into the Flames end before feeding it to Nagel who made no mistakes putting it into the net for the first of his three goals. Ted Dertinger, who had a bit of an accident in the dressing room, made a late appearance and got the tying goal just before the period ended. Phil Saunders set up Dertinger on the play.

The teams played a scoreless second period with both teams playing it rather cautiously.

Twice Delhi had a man advantage in the second period but could not score.

The Hagersville Midgets skated and passed their way to a hard fought 5-2 win over Mt. Forest on Monday night in the second game of a best of five affair.

Phillip Biggar scored the first goal with Warren Jackson getting the assist. Dave Smith then converted passes by Paul Townsend and Richard Van Eyke. Biggar got his second of the night half-way into the second period to make the score 3-0. Craig McKeen and Whitey Shearson did all the work on this goal.

The visitors finally got the puck past Bill Downey who was the outstanding player on the ice in this game and made it 3-1 after two periods. Hagersville came to play and soon after the last period started, Jackson took a pass from Fryett for the 4th goal. This seemed to take the starch out of the Forest team. Fryett then got a pretty goal as he decked the goalie out of the net before pushing it by him. Jeff Baker got the final goal of the game and for Mt. Forest.
