Mr. H. Matthews presented the annual financial statement which showed a deficit of 72,952.26 as of December 31, 1972. This total is partially due to prior year ad-

The deficit for the year 1972 was \$36,654.23. Mr. Matthews attributed part of this to the fact that the O.H.C. grant was frozen at a 7 per cent level while wages were set at the beginning of the year for a 10 per cent increase.

Buy A Bag Of Carrots

Convenient packaging of carrots in transparent bags allows food shoppers a peek at the quality of the carrots. An added advantage to bagged carrots is that they store well, say food specialists at the Ontario Food Council, Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Carrots in good condition will be crisp, clean, and free from blemishes. Deep green shoulders are an indication of bitter flavor, while oversize carrots often have hard pithy cores.

At this time of year, carrots sold with tops are not Ontario carrots. Should you purchase these, be sure to cut off the tops about 1/2 inch above the crown. If left on, the tops draw moisture from the roots, causing the carrots to wilt.

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No Structural Damage In Jarvis Sewer

A second report from Underwater Tel-Eye, a firm investigating the Talbot St. sewer, shows no structural damage. Jarvis Council was told at last week's meeting.

A letter received from consulting engineer Malcolm Dickson suggested that council has nothing to lose by leaving the pipe as it

is for the time being since the pipe has now been cleaned and there is no structural damage.

At the problem area between manhole no. 3 and manhole no. 2, there is a distinct movement of pipe at the joint and a reverse grade for approximately 130', the letter said.

If remedial work was required, he said it would be necessary to replace more than the 130'.

However, Mr. Dickson does not think this joint dislocation will seriously hinder the flow of sewage.

Since the blocked area has now been cleaned out, he said this situation may well be one "that you are prepared to live with."
