Keep Cut **Tulips**

Now is the time when cut tulips are becoming available in supermarkets, florists' shops, and garden centers. These flowers are greenhouse-grown and marketed at their peak, says John Hughes, horticultural specialist, Ontario Ministry of

Agriculture and Food. Last fall tulip bulbs were planted in flats and covered with about 1/2-inch of soil. The flats were then placed in "bulb houses" at a temperature of 38 to 40 degrees. This provided the bulbs with the dormant period they require to bloom.

About the middle of January, after the shoots have emerged, the flats are moved into the greenhouse to allow the plants to develop. The tulips are watched carefully during this time, because strong sunlight can damage the tender foliage.

Cut tulips will last quite well in the home if normal care is taken. Fresh water should be provided daily. Cool temperatures at night will help keep them fresh longer.


