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Cancer Campaign In April

Hagersville and District Cancer Campaign will be going on for the entire month of April 1973.

Again, we have a quota to meet and it is hoped people will be fully met.

The Haldimand County Unit target is \$10,000.00 which makes \$1,000.00 the share of the load.

Some interesting facts are that from each dollar donated, 58 cents goes for research. It is estimated that during the year of 1973, 65,000 new cases of cancer will be detected; 30,000 people will die from cancer and over 100,000 people will receive treatment.

Also from each dollar 18 cents is spent on Service to Patients and Lodges where there are 55,000 working in this program alone. Education receives 13 cents from each dollar donated. Death from cancer can be prevented

by education - dispelling fear and ignorance of the disease.

The need is far too great and much too urgent to depend upon money from Community Chests, Red Feathers and District Charities.

\$\$ And Good Sense

William J. Martin of the bad check passer may be on his way out, and that should be cheered by all of us since he costs every man, woman and child about \$50 a year in higher prices.

The answer seems to be a thumbprint, incontrovertible evidence about the identity of the check passer, applied to the back of a check by a new inkless process.

Following a successful test in California, many stores are now starting to order a "little black box" manufactured by Identicator Corp.

In the Redwood City pilot study, police reported a 31.2% drop in criminal complaints during the six-month test with savings of several thousands of dollars by retailers.

One chain store operator in the city of 55,000 said that checks returned for insufficient

funds dropped from \$4,000 a quarter to less than \$1,400.

With Identicator, a customer simply presses his thumb against the back of the check, usually in a square space stamped on it by the clerk. The check is then inserted into the "little black box" and a lever is pushed which develops the print by a dry chemical spray process.

While still undergoing tests, its proponents say that Identicator presents no awkward delays, being faster than the present credit department checks. It's another innovation which promises to improve the efficiency of retailers and thereby cut costs. Watch for it in your area.
