"Starting with the Spring-Summer 1973 issue," notes Rosemary McMurtry, editorial director, "we are bringing you two new services. The

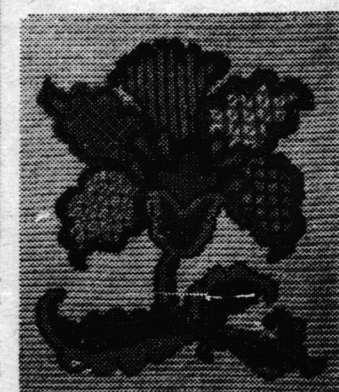
first is a list of craft fairs scheduled throughout the United States this year. The second will help you find some necessary craft supplies so that you may begin your new project right away."

Dean Says—

Schools Dilute Skills

Dilution of skills and knowledge in mathematics and science taking place in the new high school programs in Ontario are undermining the preparation of students entering university engineering programs, according to Dr. Leslie W. Shemilt, Dean of the Faculty of Engineering at McMaster University in Hamilton.

Speaking recently before the Canadian Ceramic Society's 71st annual meeting in Toronto, Dean Shemilt said that engineering education in the province is in peril because of this lack of preparation at the high school level and "for the engineering schools to adapt fully to the new high school system will be tremendously wasteful of human resources and of financial resources."

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Senator Says—

Liberals Learned Lesson

Senator Joan Neiman, a Toronto lawyer, addressed more than 300 Liberals at the annual meeting in the Simcoe Recreation Centre last Wednesday. She stated that the Federal Liberal Government got the message of the voters last October and were acting upon it.

She regretted the defeat of Dr. David Marshall and stated that the minority government had learned its lesson and was acting upon it.

Bob Andras was doing a good job in correcting the administration of U.I.C. which had not been well handled, she said. Ottawa must be informed of abuses in order to correct them.

"Write to Ottawa" and give constructive criticism she said. The members have learned their lessons and will act upon information received.

Senators are now more active than before. She said she did not believe that Senators should have the veto and stated that while the senate was thought to be composed of workers who were put out to pasture, she found this to be a false idea. Named to the senate last

September, she said she found it to be a group of very brilliant people. Canadian citizens do not realize its importance.

Trudeau is listening now and changing. He may have been too intellectual and therefore had poor public relations she said. The West really felt that the rest of Canada did not care about them, but they are now finding that the Prime Minister is interested and they are loving him since his recent visits there.

She stated that there could be an election anytime. The Liberals remain in power by the tolerance of the N.D.P. and wish to get as much accomplished as possible before the showdown which could be within two months. It is necessary to be prepared.

She said she would like to take back to Ottawa the report of a change of feeling in Norfolk - Haldimand where Tobacco is the problem. The tobacco industry is the means of livelihood here and must be supported.

Speaking of the Capital gains tax, she asserted that Canada was one of the last countries in the world to adopt this and it is not

likely to be abolished. But there will be changes and while abuses will be cleared up, there will be no witch hunt, she said.

The problem of wage and price freeze is a weekly subject of discussion, she said. If everything cannot be frozen, it is not only unrealistic but ineffective. If wages are frozen but rent goes up, someone will be caught.

She welcomed a question period and suggestions from the voters in the area.

She was thanked by Jean Sparks and presented with a carton of apples which Norfolk is famous for.
