Fire Chief, William McClarty of the Hagersville Volunteer Fire Department has released the following valuable information that may interest all local and surrounding area residents.

A list compiled from the Fire Log for a five-year period, commencing 1968, shows the Hagersville Volunteer Firemen responded to calls as follows: Walpole - 76; Oneida - 47; Mississauga - 11; and Village of Hagersville 50. The total cost (including a share of the new fire truck which was purchased in the year 1968) was Walpole - \$15,847.50; Oneida - \$12,247.50; Mississauga - \$8,335.00; and Village of Hagersville - \$47,971.37 over the same five year period.

Artisans To Display Work





Due to the illness of Rev. Martin Rule, minister of Hagersville United Church, the Rev. Cecil Dawson of Burlington spoke to the congregation on Sunday morning, March 25 at the worship service.

Speaking briefly to the children of the Junior Congregation, he told them how their young lives are surrounded by love. "Love that comes from parents, friends and most of all from God," he said.

His topic for the morning service was "Grace." He referred to grace as being much the same as, and very similar to "love." One

cannot see it, touch it, but one feels it inside the body and through spiritual meaning. Rev. Since July 1st falls on a Sunday this year, there has been some question as to when Hagersville's Lions Parade and July 1st celebrations should be held.

At Monday night's council meeting, a letter was received from Bill Knowles, MP (Haldimand-Norfolk) explaining the situation.

"It is set out in the Act respecting Dominion Day that holidays for employees shall fall on the Monday following July 1st, if July 1st falls on a Saturday or Sunday. For this reason, it will mean the Statutory Holiday will be on Monday, July 2nd."

However, Mr. Knowles added that official celebrations in Ottawa will take place on Sunday, July 1st.
