Growing more of your own protein this year? The first answer that may come to mind for cattlemen could be growing soybeans. But producing soybeans has its problems too like weed control, inoculating with the proper bacteria and later in the year combining to get all the beans that grow close to the ground.

Producing more of your own protein this year could involve cutting hay earlier when the percentage of protein in the crop is higher. For some this may mean putting the crop in the silo.

If the crop is a stand of alfalfa that is good enough to keep for another year or two, then it should not be cut until June 1 or whenever bloom is starting.

Direct seeding alfalfa this spring could produce one or two cuttings of a high protein crop this year. But with this suggestion goes the warning that direct seeding should be done early so that the alfalfa is well established before hot dry weather.

Even under the good conditions that existed for spring seeding during the third and fourth weeks of April, some idle fields were observed that could have been seeded if a few runs of tile drainage were installed.

Now is the time to arrange for chemical weed control in the 1973 crop. Copies of the 1973 publication number 75

Included in this year's publication is a listing of the Ministry of the Environment Pesticide Control Offices. Target dates for corn planting should be May 7 to 12. During the past few years yields in this county have been reduced with later planting. Earlier planting did not seem to give any added yield.

Research at Ridgewood has shown that more nitrogen is required if applied before planting corn. For those who prefer to apply nitrogen early the college suggests applying an extra 30 pounds per acre. The calculations provided with the soil test are based on results with a side-dressed application of nitrogen. Field research outside of southwestern Ontario however has shown little difference between pre-plant and side-dress applications.

Turning The Clock Back In Jarvis

Written January 1963 by Mrs. R. A. Miller (Cont. from last week)

The first school in Jarvis was on Talbot St. across from the Anglican Church. Mr. Frank Brock, a pensioned soldier, who had lost a leg in war before coming to Canada was the first teacher. The Brocks were related to General Sir Isaac Brock. There were no churches in Jarvis at this time and occasionally a travelling minister held services in the school. This was previous to 1846 when the first Church - Anglican was erected in the village. The new log school was built on the site of Lundy and Henderson's Garage. The first Public School Board Records are dated 1857. This log school was shown in a picture of Walpole St. 1865. The only modern conveniences were cool air conditioning through cracks in the floor.

Monson St. was named for Wm. Jarvis. This was his middle name. Davis, Lydia, Elizabeth and Mary Streets were all named for his family.

Doctors in Jarvis are as follows: Dr. Carlos (Uncle of Mr. Ernest Walker, Principal Jarvis Public School and Dr. Herbert Walker of Dunnville), Dr. Langrill Dr. Newell, Dr. Leathardale, Dr. Henderson, Dr. Sutherland, Dr. Tweelie, Dr. Jones, Dr. Krawetz and Dr. Lyons.

No better description can be given him (Mr. Jarvis) than to quote the inscription which appears below a stained glass window in St. James (Anglican Cathedral in Toronto).

"Sacred to the memory of the Honourable William Jarvis U.E.L., an officer of the First Canadian Regiment or Queen's Ranger's. Served with that Corp during the American Revolutionary War. Was secretary of state for the Province of Upper Canada during the administration of Governor Simcoe and first Provincial Grand Master of the Order of Free and accepted Masons during the same period and an original pew holder of this church. Was born at Stamford Connecticut 11th of September, 1756 died at York (Toronto) Upper Canada August 13th, 1817. Russell, Hunter and Core 1792 to 1817."
