Lloyd S. Culver Retires From Norfolk Co-op Board

At the Annual Meeting of the members of the Norfolk Co-op Board N.J. Hill of Delhi. President of the Norfolk Co-operative reported sales of \$14,220,336.00 for 1972. He told the members present that sales had increased in excess of one million dollars from the previous year and that over \$250,000.00 had been returned to the members in volume discounts and patronage.

General Manager, G. W. McNern spoke briefly to the meeting outlining some of the capital projects completed in 1972. These included the purchase of the former Oil Tobacco Building in Simcoe, the construction of 120,000 Bushel grain storage at the Waterford elevator and the construction of a new store in Jarvis.

President, N. J. Hill read a letter from Lloyd S. Culver who resigned from the Board of Directors after serving

as a director on the Co-op board continuously since 1934. During the 39 years as a director he served as President in the years 1946, 1947, 1965 and in 1966.

At the election for directors Sylvanus Culver, Simcoe, N. J. Hill, Delhi and Jim Purdy, Courtland were elected to serve on the Board of Directors for a three year term. Other directors presently on the Co-op Board are Dave Erwin Waterford, Ross Leedham St. Williams, Bruce Miller Jarvis, Roy J. Smith Simcoe and W. P. Watt Waterford.

Mr. Ken Marshall, Director of United Co-operative of Ontario spoke to the meeting. He gave a short report on the business activities of United Co-operatives of Ontario and outlined some of the responsibilities a director has to the Co-operative.
