

Texaco Plans

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The refinery will be adjacent to the new Ontario Hydro generating station and a steel plant to be built by the Steel Company of Canada Ltd. It is expected that these three major installations will form the nucleus of a large new industrial complex which will attract secondary industries to the region.

Mr. Mingay said that particular emphasis has been placed on environmental engineering in the design of the refinery. It incorporates safeguards employing the latest technology and is designed to comply with all of Ontario's requirements for air and water conservation. These investments in environmental protection will account for a significant portion of the refinery's cost, Mr. Mingay said.

Texaco's application for a refinery site in Walpole Township was approved by the Ontario Municipal Board in 1970. Acquisition of the property was completed in 1971. Since that time, the company has carried out initial site preparation work and has completed detailed engineering design.

The new plant, to meet Texaco's growing customer requirements in Ontario, will manufacture a wide range of petroleum products which will meet present and anticipated quality standards. The company's other Ontario refinery at Port Credit will continue to operate as a necessary supplement to the new Nanticoke Plant.

Norfolk will not contain the desirable minimum population for the support of regional government. A merger with Brant will meet that requirement and provide a strong source of urban development experience at the regional level.

(b) Brant-Norfolk will form part of the labour pool for Nanticoke and should therefore share regionally the tax benefit of new industrial assessment.

(c) The inclusion of Brant with Haldimand-Norfolk will help to ensure a self-contained region. It can serve to reduce the extent of commuting to the Hamilton area.

(d) The Tuscarora and New Credit reserves, with a combined area of 80 square miles and a 1971 census population of 4,757, will also form part of the labour pool for Nanticoke.

We all know that it's costing more and more to feed our families these days. Recent U.S. government figures indicate that the difference is \$109 more during the past year.

The theoretical retail market basket for a typical family of four is up more than 8% over 1972. At an annual rate, it's costing the average family \$1,409 (February, 1973) compared with \$1,300 for the previous year.

The Department of Agriculture report shows that the farm value of that cost was \$606, up \$114 over the year before. The middleman's costs were \$803, up \$21.

Supermarket prices rose for nearly all items during the past year, especially for meats, eggs, lettuce and milk. The farm value of what families pay was up about 18% for the year, while wholesale and retail costs rose about 2.6%.

While some relief is in sight, selected items will continue to increase in cost before starting to drop.

Such reports underscore the importance of wise consumer shopping, proper preparation before shopping, purchases of more economical cuts of meat (and ways to prepare them), and avoidance of some of the more expensive convenience food items. It takes a lot more homework to eat well and maintain a good budget these days.
