

## MTC Seeks "Task Force"

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to 20 people representing various interests across the whole county. Data on social, environmental and economic factors was collected for the "input stage," which is now nearing completion, Mr. Oliver said.

Tom MacDonald, area coordinator for the MTC, told council the study encompasses existing person traveling patterns, present system performance, major inter urban truck flow, identification of environment, future transportation demand estimates, development of transportation alternatives, the selection of a transportation plan and a periodic review. There are four phases in the study:

Phase 1 - The Citizen Advisory Group would form to discuss methodology, local transportation experiences and objectives. It would then proceed with the analysis of such information as transportation demand forecasts, environmental factors

and transportation deficiencies.

Phase 2 - Based on the analyses of the Citizen Advisory Group, the MTC team will identify the options open to the transportation planners.

Phase 3 - At a Citizen Advisory Group meeting, the MTC team will present a plan recommendation based on the coordinated evaluation of all the Citizen's Advisory Groups.

Phase 4 - The general public will be invited to discuss the recommended transportation plan, and to suggest revisions, prior to final plan selection.

Gordon Miller, reeve of Walpole, told the ministry representatives, he was disappointed. He said he thought council members would receive a map showing something definite so that "we have something to think about . . . get into the meat of it." Mr. Oliver answered

that before the department could get to the point of putting something concrete before council, they must get public involvement. "We will be getting down to the nuts and bolts," he added.

John Kincaid, reeve of Hagersville, agreed with Ken Mustard, deputy-reeve of Dunnville, that council should not be discouraged because they are going to have an opportunity to contribute.

Mr. Mustard suggested county council's roads committee act as the nucleus of this advisory committee.

Dr. William Austin, reeve of Jarvis, also questioned the ministry's representatives why the department is decreasing local road grants when they know the transportation on roads is increasing.

"While you're studying, roads in this area are going to pot," he said.

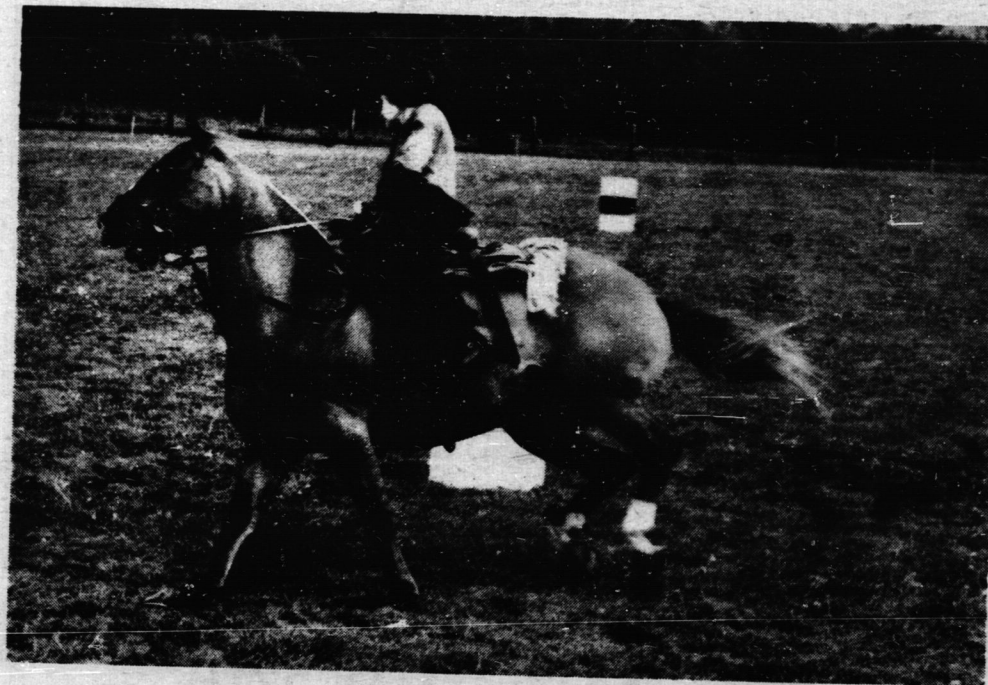
