Watson Wins 30 Lap Race  
At Cayuga Speedway

CAYUGA SPEEDWAY Bill Watson of Toronto drove a 1973 Mustang to victory Friday night in the 30 lap Red Cap feature race at Cayuga International Speedway, for Late Model "Super Stock" racing cars.

In winning, the young Toronto ace scored his third victory of the evening's events. He won two supporting events on the 11 race program.

Watson's victory stopped Art Clark of West Seneca, N.Y. from scoring a "Hat Trick," as the swift American has won the last two feature races at Cayuga International Speedway. Clark was involved in a seven car pile-up that came on the 15 tour of the 5-8 mile paved super-oval, and placed him well back in the field at the restart.

Finishing second, was London's Earl Ross, driving a 1973 Chevelle, while third went to Willowdale's Norm Lelliott in a 1972 Camaro. Both Ross and Lelliott were inches behind the winner at the finish.

The first of four caution flags came on the first lap when former N.H.L. Hockey player, Andy Brown of

Stoney Creek was involved with two other cars in a wild spin. The second caution flag came with the seven car pile-up while the third caution came on lap 17 when three cars collided on the front chute. The last was on lap 20 when Roger Kelly of Perry, N.Y. drove into the retaining wall that rings the circuit. All drivers escaped injury.

The leaders average speed for the first 15 laps was 97.8 m.p.h. The pace was slowed considerably for the 30 lap race as a result of the four cautions.

The final eight laps run without further delay and the top ten of the 23 starters finished on the same lap as the winner.

With his win, Watson now moves into fourth place in the \$5,000 Red Cap Cayuga Interna-

tional Speedway points fund and holds the same place in the \$10,000 combined Red Cap fund established between Cayuga and London's Delaware International Speedway.

Leading both Red Cap funds is London's Earl Ross with 58 points at Cayuga and 88 points in the combined fund. Second in the Cayuga fund is defending track champion Jerry Makara of Westland, Michigan with 54 points while third in the Cayuga fund is Brantford's Harold Brown with 49 points.

The combined fund has Makara in second place with 82 points, and Brown third with 78 points.

The next race at Cayuga International Speedway will be Friday June 1 starting at 8:30 p.m.
