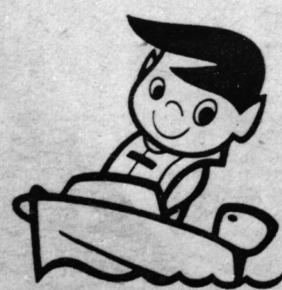

Hagersville Lions Visit Nanticoke

Eighty-seven guests and Lions visited the Ontario Hydro Nanticoke Generating Station; guests were present from Blackheath, Cayuga, Oneida Township and many from Hagersville.

Following a sumptuous cafeteria type of dinner at 7:15 p.m., movies and slides were shown in the auditorium.

Colin Hendry, public relations officer, explained that until 1950 Niagara Falls supplied the provinces electricity, now it only supplies one third of ours.

The rest comes from similar generating stations such as they have at Nanticoke. When Nanticoke generating station is complete, it will be the world's largest and it itself will supply double the power of Niagara Falls. The plant, when completed, will use 1400 tons of coal per hour and two million gallons of water a minute.

During the question

and answer period, it was interesting to learn that last December 27th, Ontario used more electricity than at any time previously and we were within 1% of our total production of electricity.

We all then were outfitted with hard hats and taken on a tour of the 20 storey building and one third of a mile in length. We viewed the plant operation, the present building and the extension that is being added to the giant steam producing boilers, turbines and generators.

The large control rooms, the viewing of the burning coal furnaces by closed circuit T.V. and the computers that were in control of production were toured. The huge building, much to everyone's surprise was literally filled with machinery and equipment.
