40 Days & 40 Nights

West Haldimand voters have the proverbial 40 days and 40 nights to assess and pick their candidates to serve under the new regional government comprising Haldimand and Norfolk counties.

On December 10th, we are all off to the polls to elect upper and lower tier representatives to serve for the next three years.

Town of Haldimand residents (Hagersville, Oneida, Caledonia, Seneca, Cayuga, Rainham, South Cayuga, North Cayuga) must elect one mayor, two regional representatives and 15 local councillors.

City of Nanticoke citizens (Jarvis, Walpole, Woodhouse, Townsend, Port Dover, Waterford) will be putting into office one mayor, three regional representatives and nine local councillors.

Some area citizens have questioned financing of lower tier representatives. Is the region going to pay a uniform salary to all local councillors . . . when the Town of Haldimand with the lowest population (10,828) has the most number of reps. and the City of Nanticoke, which has the greatest population (18,932), has only nine?

This is not the case. Roger Warner of the ministry of intergovernmental affairs told the Record Thursday, local councils set and pay their local councillors wages. Quite often this is done on a per diem basis.

Mr. Warner suggested that municipalities with a greater number of representatives would presumably have a lighter work load per councillor. So, perhaps this would justify a lower salary rate for councils with greater numbers than others.

Such an arrangement would only be fair for the taxpayer who has to dish out the monies.

What about regional salaries? The Peel regional council recently set their salaries at \$10,000, in addition to their earnings from sitting on local council. Although salary levels for councillors in other Ontario regions range from \$3,000-\$7,000, a Peel representative said the councillors fought their election on the basis of being full-time councillors.

Undeniably salaries for regional and local councillors can be expected to take a jump upward. After all, the workload of about 45 county councillors alone will be shouldered by 19 regional reps. And, every municipality will be experiencing a drastic cut in the total number of area councillors.

Even if councillors' future salaries doubled, it won't cost the taxpayer anymore because of the cut in numbers, Mr. Warner said. So, they can afford to pay themselves more.

Since it is our tax dollar which will be invested so heavily in regional government councillors, we can't afford to be apathetic or ignorant of candidates and their platforms. Our future will be in their hands and a poor choice will cost plenty.

The annual meeting of the Haldimand Federation of Agriculture, this year will be held on November 5th. (3) To facilitate the spread of information of concern to the farming industry, to all farmers in the county.
(4) To be a local unit of O.F.A. in every respect.
