The reaction of the owners should be very good, he said, because the price and terms are good. And, the consortium has had time to show that they are not speculators.

The options will be the same; there will be no new terms, he said. "We're not prepared to stretch.... We feel we did a real good job in the first place. We took into account the value as a farm as well as its potential value," he explained. The average price offered was \$1650 an acre. "In the case of high quality farms, we compensated," he added.

Mr. Cherkas said they were offering \$1.00, "a token amount," to hold the options longer. "We paid them originally for the option," he said.

Although the consortium, Revenue Properties Ltd., Victoria Wood Development Corp., Metropolitan Trust Co. and Sifton Properties Ltd., feel their site is the best, they are not picking up the options because.... "how would you like to have \$30 million worth of farmland in the area," he said, if the deal didn't go through.

On Monday, it was reported that almost 4,000 acres had been re- optioned.

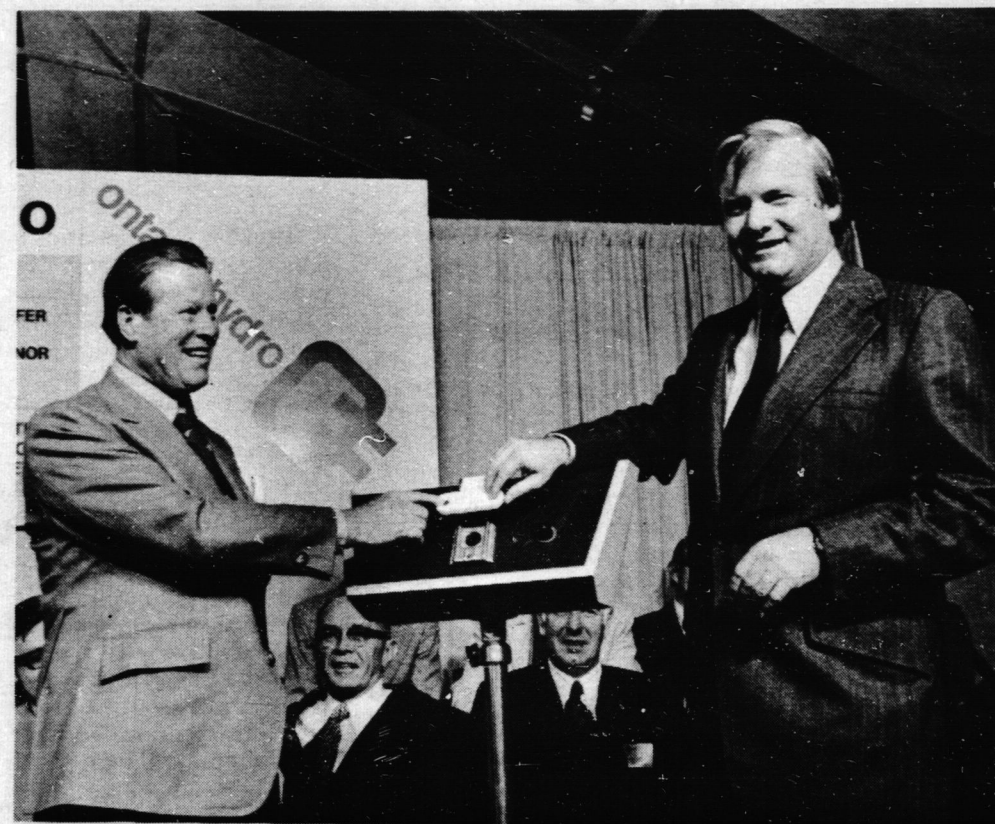
Mr. and Mrs. Hare gave a vivid, interesting description of their tour of South America, showing their slides.

At Caledonia, the prime interest is in twenty-two calibre sporting rifle competition. They are relatively inexpensive and can be fitted with sights to make them competitive in any company. Many good shooters have done well with the original Mossberg sights, while others have added sights worth more than the gun. Open sights will not work under the artificial lights.

## Jarvis Native Dies

Margaret Moreland, a former member of the Royal Conservatory of Music and a singing teacher at her Elm St. studio in Rosedale for more than 30 years, died last Monday.

She was in her late 80s, but taught classical music in her studio until a few years ago.

She was born in Jarvis. Her father, Dr. John A. Langrill, was a doctor on the Six Nations Reserve at Ohsweken where she spent her childhood and was named an honorary Indian princess.

Mrs. Moreland graduated from the University of Toronto in 1910 and studied in London and at the New England Conservatory in Boston.

She taught her four children music. Her eldest daughter, Marianne Pashler, of Schenectady, New York, concert violinist, has played with the Toronto Symphony.

She also leaves Diane Moreland of New York; Johanne Sterling, a singer in New York, and John Moreland, of Hyannis, Mass., who was a television song-and-dance man in Toronto in the 1930's.
