Walpole OKs

Texaco Use Of Water Lot For Sewage Outpour

A Texaco request to use a water lot for emptying sewage effluent into Lake Erie was okayed by Walpole Council Friday night.

Subject to the approval of the Ministry of Natural Resources, council endorsed Texaco Canada Ltd.'s intent

to utilize a water lot at Lot 10, Concession 1 for the purpose of discharging the contents of their sewer lines 3,400 feet off shore.

This is not raw sewage the company is planning to dump into the water. And, there seems to be little doubt Tex-

aco will meet all the regulations governing sewage effluent.

Councillor Phil Hare explained that the sewer effluent will be treated water which has to pass through three stages of Texaco's water treatment procedure. The

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Consortium Has 11,000 Acres Reoptioned

Options on 11,000 acres in Walpole and Townsend townships have been extended for another seven months, Robert E. Mann, a Simcoe Realtor, told the Record Monday. And all of them were renewed for the nominal sum of \$1.

Mr. Mann explained that all properties in the core area of the proposed city site have been optioned except for one, as well as much

of the periphery. "Mr. Cherkas is very pleased with the support he has received from the public," he said.

The land bank located north-west of Jarvis was assembled last spring under the direction of Oakville realtor, Andrew Cherkas, for a consortium of private developers. They want a satellite city serving the Nanticoke industrial complex to be located in Walpole - Townsend

rather than Woodhouse.. an area proposed by the H - N Study Report for urban development.

The troop of local real estate agents working under Mr. Cherkas are not on the road anymore, Mr. Mann said. "We've got enough to hold the site. We're all finished except for anyone coming in...."

Council Debates Hatchery Option

Hagersville Council may option a Chicken hatchery for renovating into a four bay fire hall.

At Thursday night's council meeting, deputy reeve Norm Crawford told members the village could buy the hatchery at \$20,000. Or, they could buy it and a corner lot, to be used for parking, at \$40,000.

Mr. Crawford said two fire trucks could be put in the building,

which is located at the corner of John and Church streets, right now. And with a wall knocked out, it would facilitate four trucks.

He pointed out that the building already has heat and washroom facilities and suggested the upstairs could be used as a recreation area.

Mr. Crawford feels it would make an ideal fire hall.

Councillor Fred

Brock agreed. You'd have to "go a long ways to find a building suitable for a fire hall like that," he told council members.

Mr. Crawford explained he had been approached by a real estate agent and told the village could option the property for \$1. He made a motion that council take up the option, but it was tabled.

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
