#### Wise, Unwise And Otherwise by The Old Owl

BLACK AND WHITE

Sometimes I catch myself thinking about the so-called "colour question" and the question as to whether the white race is actually superior to the coloured or do we, who are white, just like to think it is.

We have plenty of evidence to justify such an attitude. In almost any photograph of an international gathering the non-white members nearly always are wearing Western style clothes and this seems to be a kind of endorsement of the idea that white ways are best. But this is only the outward and visible sign of something deeper. Almost all the scientific and technical advance has been made by the white races. The same goes for such matters as the adoption, by the emerging nations of Africa and Asia, of the Western style of government and Western ideas of democracy.

Two questions arise:- Are Western ideas of democracy intrinsically better than any other? Are Western inventiveness, methods of government, culture and so on really superior ? OR, are western methods only better for the places where they prevail and not suitable at all for the inhabitants of Africa and Asia? It does seem to me that we should not try to force Western style methods and ideals on the people of the new countries but should be helping those nations to adopt and use them, such as the motor car, the telephone and so on. Our western ways are not quite perfect, as witness two world wars in twenty-five years and the ever increase of crime in our midst.

It is true that practically all the inventions and developments in the fields of science have been made by white people; the people of other races seem not to care --- yet those who do go into such things have shown that they are quite capable of understanding and using any new discovery or method that the white race can produce.

Perhaps the way out is to encourage the members of the other races to be content to imitate and adapt Western ways until they are ready and able to develop their own.

One thing we must always remember is that present white development is the product of centuries whereas the other cultures have only just begun to move in such matters. The other races are not lacking in intelligence but they do lack initiative.
