Flyers Win 5-2 Over Waterford

The Hagersville Flyers took two periods to get off the ground in their first regular season game of the year, but when they did get air borne in the third period, they came home with a 5 - 2 win.

The Waterford Tri-Cats kept the Flyers off stride for the first

two periods and out shot them in the scoreless first period 9 - 5. Kirk Brown seems to be picking up where he left off last spring and kept his team in the game in the initial frame. Gary Hewit took a pass from Reid Hutchinson at the 9 minute mark of the second period to put the Cats ahead 1 - 0. Hagersville took only 20 seconds to get that goal back with Terry Fryett pulling the trigger on this one, with Glen Hewson earning the assist. Bill Winkworth gave the Flyers a one goal lead five minutes later when he scored a pretty unassisted goal to put the Hagersville crew ahead to stay.

The Flyers were not able to break the game open till late in the third period. Paul Townsend scored the winner one minute into the last period with Winkworth and John Montour earning assists. Two goals seven seconds apart at 13:45 and 13:52 put the game out of reach for the Cats.

Paul Fryett got the first one with Bob Powless assisting; then Powless scored with Wendell Martin helping out on the play. Rick

Hill scored the last goal for Waterford after being set up by Clint Campbell.

Waterford held a 25 - 23 edge in shots on goal for the game, with the Flyers having 9 of the 12 penalties called. Hagersville was without Anthony Yacobino and Ross McKeen, both sitting out suspensions from last year. The Flyers dressed only 15 men for this contest, but it is one way for coach Ken Morrison to get the boys in shape.

Paul McCarthy, who played a standout game on defence, scored the lone goal of the second period at the 10 minute mark. Kirk Brown picked up an assist on the play which turned out to be the winning goal.

Along with shutting out the opposition, Brown had to help set up the winning goal. For the second game in a row the Flyers came up big in the last period. Two goals 30 seconds apart by Terry Fryett at 1:50 and 2:22 put the Flyers on ice for the game. Sandy Gibbons and Dean Webb scored assists on the

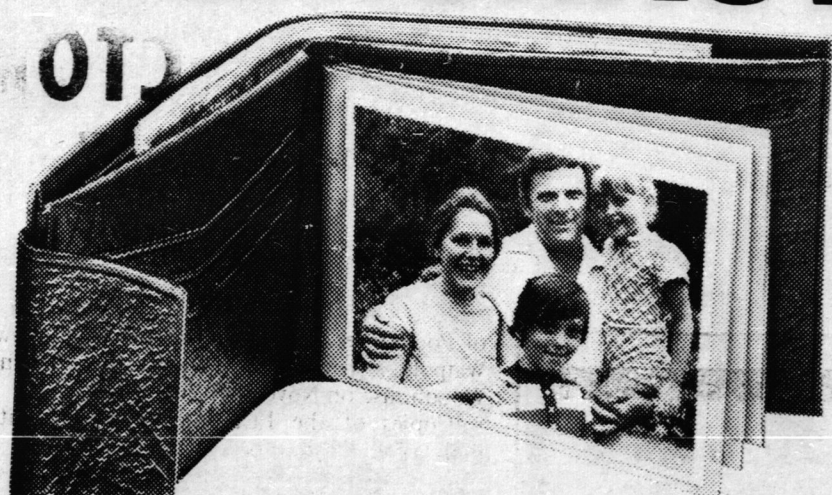
