### Hagersville Council Creates Deputy Fire Chief Position

The position of deputy fire chief with the Hagersville Volunteer Fire Department was created by Hagersville Council Thursday night.

And, deputy - reeve Norm Crawford made a motion that Cloyce Sitter be appointed deputy - chief commencing November 1st.

Mr. Sitter has been acting as deputy-chief when fire chief Bill McClarty is not available. Mr. Crawford's motion was made on the recommendation of Mr. McClarty.

The new post includes a raise in pay from the \$100 annual salary each fireman receives to \$300. The fire chief receives \$500.

### School Dental Program

The Dental Division of the Haldimand-Norfolk Health Unit are once again planning their yearly fluoride treatment for area schools. Last year, of the total number of children eligible, 9,338 (84%) took part.

This was approximately 2,000 more than the previous school year. The program this year will include grade two children, and it is the aim of the Health Unit to eventually cover all children with this dental service each year.

**Quarries** - Council has been receiving complaints from north end residents concerning blasting by Haldimand Quarries.

**Service Lanes** - Council was told the cheques from Imperial Oil and Enzo Marfisi for their service lanes had been received, but not Heaslip Motors.

**Traffic By Law** - Hagersville's Traffic Bylaw was given its first and second reading at council Thursday night. It now goes to the ministry of transportation and communication for their approval.

Council lawyer Ed McCarthy said "if enforced to the hilt and

there's no other parking in town, there's going to be a lot of squawking". This raises the question - is there enough parking spots, he told council.

Police Chief Warren Burger told council the police realize there is a need for more parking in the village, so they won't be slapping tickets around unreasonably.

**Fill** - Council received a letter assuring them fill will be placed between the curb and property line on Hewitt Drive within a couple weeks. This reply came as a result of a complaint made by John Cecchini at a previous council meeting.

## History Of Hagersville

### HAGERSVILLE 1900-1910

The population of Hagersville in 1906 was 1500. In those days before cars, the citizens worked in the town in which they lived, and commuting to another place to work was virtually unheard of.

With three stone quarries already in operation, and a large proportion of the businesses still doing trade today already in business, Hagersville was a thriving and busy town. Many businesses had sheds at the back and for no extra cost, sheltered and accommodation for the horses was given while the farmers conducted their business.

The streets were lined with hitching posts where people doing business could leave their horses, and some more affluent business ran complimentary stables where a businessperson's horse would be fed, watered and rested during the time business was being attended to, all as part of the business.

Life in general was much different than it is today. For instance, early in the morning, the woman of the house would go out to the street at the sound of the milkman's bell and fetch milk from him in her own jar or bowl. Now, a good wife would insist on purchasing night milk, so her husband could have top cream in his morning coffee.

In 1903 Hagersville experienced a disastrous fire in the downtown area which destroyed a jewellery store, printing shop, butcher shop, and bakery. At that time, the water supply was extremely inadequate, and if a fire started, chances were that it would have to burn itself out before it could be stopped.

In 1901 this advertisement for the Busy Corner Store, Hagersville appeared in the Jarvis Record:

**February Sale of Wrappers** - Ours are unlike the wrappers made especially for sales and which consist mainly of skimmed, carelessly cut and poorly sewed garments. We offer you nothing but perfect goods, properly made from this season's patterns of wrapperettes - sizes 31 to 44.

Regular \$1.25 wrapperettes in red and black, and blue and black wrapperettes, waist lined, and nicely made with yoke, full skirt for 98c.

Regular \$1.50 and \$1.75 wrapperettes, in black and white, red and black, and black with fancy stripes, made with yoke and nicely trimmed with braid for \$1.35.

Regular \$2.00 wrapperettes of navy and white, made with deep flounced skirt, and different styles of pretty fancy wrappers for \$1.65.

Pure Clover Honey for 16c a pound -- bring your own container.

In this decade, many businesses were founded, since work was needed in town to support the 1500 people who lived here.

In 1901 David Norris Almas founded the Almas seed business, using clover and grass seed cleaning apparatus which he invented. The business, with its roots in the early twentieth century, is still thriving today.

The Hagersville Creamery was founded in 1905 by Mr. Currie, and it is now the only remaining creamery in the county, and the Haldimand Quarries and Construction Company was founded in 1910.

In a book published in 1908, written by a Mr. Hager, many of the businesses placed ads in the book. Some of them are worth repeating.

Business was taken care of. The bale will be packed later for Evangel Hall, Toronto.

- 3 COUNCILLORS** - To serve on both regional and area council - one such councillor to be elected from Ward 1 (Ward 1 comprises of the Village of Jarvis, the Township of Walpole and part of the Township of Rainham as defined in Ontario Regulations 653/73.)
- one such councillor to be elected from Ward 2 (Ward 2 comprises of the Town of Port Dover and the Township of Woodhouse as defined in Ontario Regulations 653/73.)
- one such councillor to be elected from Ward 3 (Ward 3 comprises of the Town of Waterford and the Township of Townsend as defined in Ontario Regulations 653/73.)

Notice is also given that the Municipal Elections Act, 1972 provides that a Nomination Paper:

- (a) shall be signed by at least ten electors whose names are entered in the polling lists of electors entitled to vote in an election to such office;
- (b) shall state the name, occupation and address of the candidate in such a manner as will identify him and the office for which he is nominated; and
- (c) shall state the name and address of each elector signing the nomination paper.

Take Notice that pursuant to Section 11 of Ontario Regulations 653/73 an elector is not eligible to be elected as a councillor for a ward unless his principal place of residence was in such ward at any time during the period of enumeration as set out in Section 9 of this Order.

An elector is not eligible to be elected as the Mayor of an area municipality unless his principal place of residence was in such area municipality at any time during the period of enumeration as set out in Section 9 of Ontario Regulation No. 653/73.

And further take notice that the nomination paper shall state for which office and in which ward or area, except those running at large, the candidate is proposing to be nominated. And further take notice that where the candidate is running in a ward or area his nomination paper must be signed by people on the Polling List of Electors in that specific ward or area.
