Tripled Fire Fees Requested For Part Of Six Nations Reserve

A 200 per cent hike in fire protection fees, which will affect the section of the Six Nations Reserve north of the Grand River, is being sought by the Onondaga township fire department. Township fire chief James Smith told the elected band council recently the proposed new rates would boost costs per fire call from \$100 for the first hour and \$50 for each additional hour to \$300 and \$150 respectively. In addition there would be a standby fee of \$100, he said.
