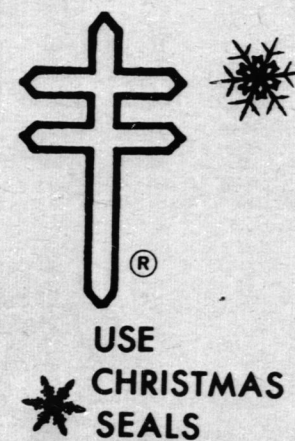
Jack Bateman in introducing his acts of magic, stated that "magic was like Watergate, you know something funny is going on, but you can't figure what."

On The Farm Front

The money allocated for the Capital Grant program for Ontario farmers for the current fiscal year has now been committed for applications received by November 2. Capital grant applications will continue to be processed for payment in April 1974 when the funds for the next fiscal year become available.

As originally intended the 12 year program started April 1, 1967, continues. A limit is placed, however, on the amount to be processed each year.

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Dairymen are reminded that Doug Johnston, Milk Marketing Board fieldman, will be available at the Cayuga Agriculture office on the third Friday of each month. Discussion of milk marketing matters can next be arranged for Friday, November 16. Requests for help or information can also be made directly at any time by contacting Doug at Caledonia (765-4812).

Milk Industry Branch fieldmen of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture & Food, call at the Cayuga office each Friday to serve requests made by Haldimand dairymen.

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Insulation is a small part of the original construction costs of a building. With the increase in price for various energy or heating supplies, good insulation becomes more important. Insulating buildings after the

original construction is somewhat more expensive but may be worth considering.

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Requests for permits for 1974 - 75 European Cattle importation should be filed with Agriculture Canada by December 31. Application forms are available from the Veterinary Director General, Agriculture Canada, Ottawa, K1A 0C5

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The 1973 Ontario Farm Tax Rebate will amount to 50 percent of the net farm tax bill. Application for the rebate is to be made on forms that will be mailed to registered owners of farm land. A minimum farm

income of \$2000. is required.

Tom Weber, assistant agricultural representative in Haldimand for the past two and one-half years, is to be transferred to Waterloo County on December 17. The Haldimand vacancy is to be advertised and the replacement made when help is available.
