Federation News

A farmer faces more
risks than most people.
Accidental injury or
sickness can seriously
affect his work and live-
lihood. And there is
always the risk of injury
or property damage in-
volving others.

A salesman buyer
or friend may be injured
while visiting the farm.
A farm animal might
stray and damage some-
one else's property.
Farm equipment may
injure others. Chemi-
cals used in spraying
the wind to a neighbor's
property ruining his
crop. Legal action re-
sulting from any of these
occurrences could cost
the farmer his entire
savings and even his farm.

Liability insurance
protects the farmer
against such a loss. A
good farm family pro-
tection plan is available
from Co-Operators In-
surance Association of
Guelph. The Ontario
Federation of Agricul-
ture is a sponsor of
CIAG which has offices
and representatives
throughout the province.

The plan covers a
farmer and his family
against legal liability
for death, bodily injury
and property damage.
It includes limited
accidental death and im-
pairment benefits for

the family and covers
some medical expenses
of visitors and others
injured on the farm
property or through the
family's action.

It also provides cov-
erage for certain farm
animals killed in a
collision on a public
highway or railway right
of way.

Fuel Oil Jumps 70% In School System

The cost of fuel oil
in the Haldimand
County public school
system is jumping 70
per cent in January.

At a meeting in
Cayuga Tuesday, the
Haldimand Board of
Education received ten-
ders submitted to them
by suppliers for No. 2
fuel oil.

In 1973, Texaco sup-
plied the schools with
oil at \$1.520 per gallon.
Tenders were submitted
by Gulf and Petrofina
at \$2.590 per gallon (not
firm) and \$2.830 per
gallon (not firm) respec-
tively for January
to August of '74.

The Board moved to
accept the Gulf tender.
They were told that
annual consumption is
60,000 gallons and this
jump in the tender price
represents a \$ 6,700
increase.

Texaco due to a

"comedy of errors" did
not submit a tender
within the specified time
limit.

Also on energy, the
board received a memo
from the ministry of
education suggesting
means of conserving
energy in the schools.

At the meeting, a
\$103,725 addition for
Hagersville's North-
view Public School was
approved by the Hald-
imand Board.

Sketch plans for the
new construction
include a general
purpose room, bulk
storage rooms and
change rooms.

The addition is not to
be debentured, but built
out of current revenue.

A more complete
report of this meeting
will be printed in next
week's issue.

Haldimand To Choose New Warden For '74

Lorna Miller won't be
Haldimand's last
warden.

At County council
Friday, councillors ap-
proved a motion that the
custom of choosing a
new warden for each new
year be kept up, even
though the term in 1974
will be a short three
months.

Norfolk County, which

will be joined with Hald-
imand in a new region
April 1st, voted earlier
this month to extend
their warden's term for
the extra three months.

Mrs. Miller, who is
reeve of Dunnville, is
Haldimand's first fe-
male warden.

Keith Richardson,
reeve of Dunn township,
is the deputy warden.

Christmas Lights

The village's yule-
time lights will only be
shining on Christmas eve
this year.

Ontario Hydro has
requested municipal-
ities to limit decorative
lighting in order to con-
serve power.

In a letter to the
Jarvis Hydro-Electric
Commission, Hydro
says they are going to
cutback on lights on
their own buildings and
recommend the village
do the same.

Clerk Bob Lysch told
council commission
members that the
village used \$12 worth
of power last season for
their decorative lights.

Although it is a very
small amount, John
Brintnell said if every-

body thought the same
and used their lights
anyways, "where would
we be." This is some-
thing we should live
with, he said.

The Commission
decided that the vil-
lage's wreaths will be
put up, but will only
be plugged in the night
before Christmas.
