#### TAXES

To protect the citizens from galloping tax increases, John Roxburgh proposes a "Tax and Expenditure Limitation Bylaw", an air-tight formula that will control the region's budget so that it will not be able to rise faster than personal income.

their plans. He worked on the organization of the Haldimand - Norfolk Joint Study Committee and the forming of the H - N Health Unit. While on County Council Mr. Oster also served on the administration committee, home committee, road committee and finance committee.

Other organizational background includes: \* member and president of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association;

\* secretary and president of the Niagara District Guernsey Club;

\* director of the Ontario Guernsey breeder's association;

\* president of the Canadian Guernsey breeder's association;

\* 4 - H club leader for 25 years;

\* steward and elder at the Cayuga United Church.

Mr. Oster has just left the farming business, but he will continue with his job as real estate salesman, if elected. It is the type

of work which can be adjusted to fit with the mayoral job, he told the Record.

He feels, in the organization of regional government, representatives must be careful

that it doesn't get too far away from the people. That's one of the biggest drawbacks of a larger government structure, he said.

regions, there wouldn't be this problem, he added.

The Joint Study Committee recommended the O.P.P. cover the entire region. However, intergovernmental affairs minister John White rejected this in favor of the combination - regional and O.P.P.

On January 15th, a

Regional Board of Commissioners of Police will be constituted and comprise of: a) two members of the Regional Council appointed by resolution of the regional Council;

b) a judge of a county or district court designated by the Lieutenant Governor in Council; and

c) two persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

Also at the meeting: \* Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd noted the act doesn't allow for an interim levy which would mean the town will have to borrow a lot of money between January and April.

Mr. Meen said the province expects to put a "substantial sum of money in all your hands" by the end of April.

The H.N.J.S. committee requested welfare be dealt with at the local level. This was rejected in favor of the region because the department of social and community services is geared to work at that level.

All planning will be kept at the regional level until the region has developed an official plan which must be completed by December 31, 1976.

Mr. Meen said the province would like to see a closer tie between Land Division bodies, Committees of Adjustment and council. It was recommended a minority of councillors should serve on these bodies.

Volunteer fire forces will continue. However, a fire coordinator should be utilized to make sure fire departments are in communication with each other. The province will pay the travelling expenses of the coordinator. It was also pointed out that fire forces should continue serving their present areas, despite the new municipal boundaries.

Mr. Meen felt the forming of public advisory committees to assist council would be a good idea. However, they are not allowed to give honorariums. To get around this, Mr. Meen reminded the audience "you've heard of expense accounts."

## Education Notes

At last Tuesday's Haldimand County Board of Education meeting:

\* Norm Sinibaldi was appointed to the board to fill the vacancy left by the late Stanley Mitchell, who represented Walpole - Jarvis.

\* Royce Emery has been appointed Chief Engineer of the Hagersville Secondary School. Mr. Emery has been acting in this capacity since July.

\* William Prescott has been appointed to the position of Area Supervisor of Plant Maintenance and Operations, effective November 1, 1973.

\* The rental agreement between the County of Haldimand and the Board of Education expires Dec. 31, 1973. The board is requesting this lease be extended for a further three years.

\* The Board is con-

cerned over the pending action of the government to close the Hamilton Teacher's College.

The Haldimand Board is going to request Thomas Wells, minister of education, to work out an arrangement to train elementary teachers at McMaster University for the following reasons:

- 1) Hamilton serves a larger area than Brock.
- 2) More Haldimand students could reside at home if a training school were located in Hamilton as compared to Brock.
- 3) Staff at Hamilton Teacher's College would be closer to more students in a practice teaching situation.

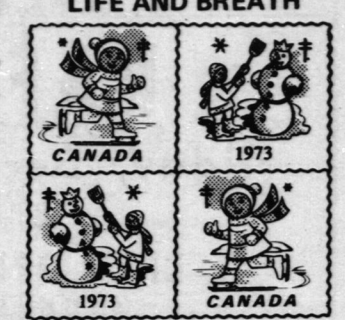
