## Bantams Square Final Series

The Hagersville Legion Bantams squared their O.B.A. final series with Thamesville at a game apiece, with a convincing 9-4 win in Hagersville Sunday afternoon.

The third and deciding game to see who wins the Bantam 'C' championship will be played in Thamesville next Saturday afternoon with the game starting at 2 p.m.

Thamesville has a good hitting team and it was one of the few

times this year that the Bantams have been out-hit. Thamesville had 10 hits and Hagersville seven in a well played playoff game.

The Legion team lost little time going after the win as they scored in the first inning. Terry Crawford walked with one out and Phil Nie doubled to the fence in center field with Crawford holding at third. Darral Watson lifted a fly ball to left and Crawford scored after the catch to give the home team a 1-0 lead and they were never behind after that.

The heavy hitting first baseman for Thamesville tripled to start the second inning and scored when Bill Winger fielded a ground ball, but couldn't make

a play. Hagersville went ahead with a run in the second after two men were out. Richard Salvatore walked and stole second. Ralph Awde who played his best game of the season in right field came through with a big single to score Salvatore.

In the third inning Mike Liscombe walked and stole second. Crawford flied out before Nie cracked his second double scoring Liscombe. Watson hit a double to score Nie. With a new pitcher coming into the game for the visitors, Mike Tataric hit the first ball to short. The short stop touched Watson going to third and threw to first for the double play.

Three runs in the last

of the 4th gave the Legion crew a good margin to work on. Salvatore walked, and Awde followed with his second hit of the game. Bill Winger walked to fill the bases. Liscombe hit a sacrifice fly to score one run, then Crawford got a clean single to plate to the two insurance runs.

Hagersville scored their 8th run in the 5th when Thamesville made two of their three errors, along with singles by Nie and a found ball by Watson. Thamesville started a rally in the top of the 7th when Badder got a homerun high over the right field fence. This was the kids third hit of the day and his third homerun of the series. Salvatore and Winger will have to get together and try to figure out a way to stop this young athlete or their playoff hopes might well go over the fence with his heavy hitting. A double and single off Winger scored the final run for the visitors.

Winger never walked a batter and struck out six with three of them coming in the last inning. Three pitchers struck out seven Hagersville batters, with Badder looking very effective over the last three innings. Liscombe scored the final run for Hagersville with some good base running, as the ball never left the infield. With vacation coming up next week the final game will be covered by Vince Petraccia who has filled in very capably for me in the past.
