A "Queen of the Furrow" Competition adds colour both in the field and at the Banquet. Contestants for this event must be 16 years of age and not have reached her 24th birthday by November 1st, 1973, married or single and residing on a farm in Haldimand County.

Competition is open to anyone. Three classes will accommodate tractors under 600 pounds, under 800 pounds and under 1000 pounds. In all classes, the driver must be weighed with the tractor. Standard factory drawbar height is mandatory.

To conclude the event, a Prize-Presentation Banquet will be held in the Fisherville Community Centre at 7:00 p.m.

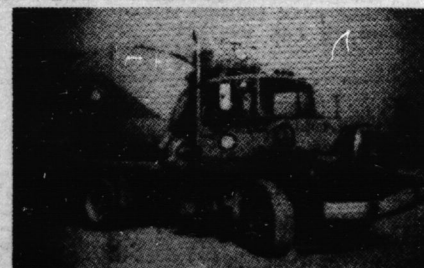
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
