at him and told him to stay where he was.

After ordering the person to drop the gun and again being told to stay where he was, Chief Bargar said Constable Davidson then drew his service revolver and ordered the person to drop the shotgun. It was dropped and the person was arrested.

Later Friday evening, Constable Davidson received a report that a .22 rifle had been discharged from a car passing through town.

About 1:15 a.m. Chief Bargar said a car driven by Milton Thomas of R. R. 2 Ohsweken was stopped on Highway 6 between Hagersville and Caledonia for careless driving. A loaded .22 rifle was found in the car. He was charged with careless driving and carrying a loaded firearm in a vehicle.

**SEX STEREOTYPES**

"Sex stereotyping of male and female roles begin in early childhood perception of his or her parents' behavior and activities, and with the child's experience of sex-differentiated games and toys. When the child reaches school age, these stereotypes are reinforced in a variety of ways. One important influence is the educational medium itself, including textbooks, films, television, tapes and picture sets."

Equal Opportunity For Women In Ontario

There is a considerable fund available for the status committee, Ms. Hill said, and they are looking into purchasing films on sex stereotyping for teacher workshops at the local level.

To illustrate sexism in textbooks, she told of a U.S. study on textbook drawings which pictured 1700 boys as compared to 800 girls and 700 men compared to 400 women. "Even girls think boys can do better," she said.

Men and boys continue to dominate illustrations in readers and textbooks, she said. And, women are portrayed doing menial tasks, while men are aggressive and work in many more fields.

Ms. Hill told the women teachers that girls are often pictured being physically smaller or in the background of a drawing. She also knocked the television favorite "Sesame Street" for perpetuating the sex stereotyping.

Ms. Hill noted the minister of education, Thomas Wells, has accepted and promised to implement the Report of an inter-ministerial committee on textbooks that recommends a plan of action for the removal of racial and sex stereotypes from all textbooks used in Ontario schools.

She questioned the teachers about career days and guidance programs in their own schools. Are the majority of speakers invited on career day men? And, she suggested job opportunity information for girls through the guidance department is also stereotyped.

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## Family Services

Both parents care about their children but this is a family with several serious problems.

A Children's Aid Worker promised to go to the home each morning to give Mrs. M. her medication for that day. Meanwhile the parents received counselling from the CAS.

These daily visits by the social worker on her way to the office were in themselves helpful. Each day she found that the babies had been washed and had their breakfast. In counselling sessions the father began to see that he would have to learn to be a parent to his children if he was to help his wife out of her depression. He was encouraged to attend AA meetings. Shirley attended a family planning clinic and decided to have a tubal ligation to prevent more births.

Thus with the coordinated help of three community agencies, the children were kept in their own home and the parents greatly improved their own well-being and functioning. "When a community can point to a good network of services which help families, fewer children need to come into the care of the Children's Aid Society," John MacGregor, Local Director of the Society explained. "Such services should include visiting homemakers, day nurseries and day care, public housing, mental health clinics, AA groups, family planning, debt counselling, volunteer big brothers and sisters. However, these services are most effective when co-ordinated for the family needing them so that there is no overlapping and no gap in service either."

Some Children's Aid Societies offer some of these services themselves. Others are formed by citizen's groups and government departments. The Children's Aid Week slogan this year is "Happy Families Make Better Communities" - and the converse is true as well!
