

Hagersville Council Meets

A Hagersville ratepayer refused to pay a recent water bill because of the quality of village water, clerk Art Roth told Hagersville Council Monday night.

Sharon Mattice of Parkview Road wants some satisfaction from council that something is being done about the condition of village water which she feels is too hard, he said.

Councillor Dominic Vanni said the village cannot do anything about their water right now because any project undertaken would be too expensive. The village's only hope is that they will be connected to a line from the lake in 5-6 years, he said.

Engineer Hans Jansen said the village is lucky it has water at all. The water level is quite low due to the dry summer, he said, and this is why the water is harder.

In a normal fall season, water in the well is only 20-15 feet from the surface, Mr. Jansen explained. At present, the water has been at the 40 foot level.

Council agreed the bill has to be paid.

"That thing can really snowball... That's got to be stopped and stopped fast," Councillor Robert Gedye said.

Also at council: John Cecchini of Hewitt Drive, Hagersville requested council action in having fill placed between his property and the road.

Mr. Cecchini explained that his property grade was originally below that of the road - a fault of either the builder or road constructor.

He told council he raised his own property to the level of the road property at a personal expense of \$104.

Now, there is a gully 10-12 feet separating his property from the road left.

He said he realized the town had not yet taken over

the subdivision, but requested fill deposited in the village's area before dirt on his property is washed into the gully.

Reeve Kincaid, noting that the village had not yet officially taken over the area, said the village could write to the developer - Haldimand Building Products - urging immediate action.

Council agreed to donate a village copier machine to the library as a public service, with the understanding that the public can use it at a nominal sum.

Dominic Vanni told council the Anglican Church is willing to give the Davison Centre to the village if the village will take it over.

And, if it was taken over by council, perhaps a recreation grant could be obtained to help pay for the deficit the Lions Club incurred when they renovated it.

Plans are well under way for the annual Oyster Supper on Nov. 15th.

Moerschfelder And Burgess Show Champs

The Black and White Show sponsored by the Norfolk County Holstein Club and held October 2nd in connection with Simcoe Fair attracted a quality exhibit of 69 head shown by nine exhibitors from the four counties of Norfolk, Haldimand, Brant and Oxford.

Alex M. McIntosh & Son, Embro, won both the Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor honours with Wayne Moerschfelder, Fisherville runner-up for Premier Exhibitor and James B. Burgess, Hagersville, runner-up for Premier Breeder. The latter was closely fol-

lowed by W. Keith Buchner of Brownsville.

Judge R. H. Brown of Welland found both his Grand and Reserve Grand Champion females in the three-year-old in milk class, the Grand Championship going to Wayne Moerschfelder on Moerschdale Citation Alert, and the Reserve Grand Championship to Brian Sayles, Paris, on Katers, Pansy Never Fear. The Judge called his Grand Champion a well-balanced individual, sharp throughout, with an excellent udder and particularly good teat

arrangement, walking on a good set of feet and legs. His Reserve Grand Champion was a big, powerful three-year-old, well balanced throughout, strong on top, and exhibiting plenty of dairy character.

The Junior Champion female was the winning senior yearling, Burglee Reflection Debbie for James B. Burgess, while the Reserve Junior award went to Alex M. McIntosh & Son on Almac Thonda Empress, the top junior yearling heifer. The Junior Champion was a

tall, stretchy heifer, exuding dairy character. The Reserve Junior Champion had good balance; was clean at the throat, head and neck.

The first prizes were well spread throughout, with no less than seven exhibitors winning at least one first.

James B. Burgess showed the Champion bull, winning with Burglee Reflection Admiral, while the Reserve Champion bull, Embro Almac Marquis Pam, was shown by Alex M. McIntosh & Son. Only one bull class was shown, that for bull calves.

W. Keith Buchner had both the winning aged cow in milk and the winning dry cow. Other first prize winners included: Wayne Moerschfelder, first four-year-old; Laurence Smith & Son, Scotland, first two-year-old; Keg Lane Farms, Paris, first heifer calf; K. C. Bacher & Son, Cayuga, first progeny of dam; and Alex McIntosh & Son, first Breeder's Herd and first best uddered female, the latter prize won by the second aged cow in milk Almac Mary S. Heritage.

Mrs. Ansari was thanked by Mrs. Emerson Phillips. Lunch and a social hour brought an enjoyable and profitable evening to a close.
