

## Flyers Drop 5-3 Decision In First Exhibition Game

"That team is going to do some damage to someone in that Junior D loop," said Simcoe coach Don Stewart after watching his Junior C club record a 5-3 victory over the Jr. D Hagersville Flyers in a penalty marred exhibition match last Sunday night in Simcoe. The three hour plus game saw referees Rick Kowalski and Gord Anderson hand out a total of 50 penalties - 28 of which went to the Flyers.

Added Stewart, "Hagersville is a hustling, aggressive club, and they've got good size." The same two clubs tangle again this Friday, October 19th in the new Six Nations Arena in Ohsweken starting at 8 p.m.

Certainly, penalties dominated the contest, but there were other highlights - such as the steady, and at times brilliant, goaltending of Dick Tweedle. Despite the fact that he yielded two goals to the Jets in his half of the game, Tweedle stymied Simcoe on several occasions with "rabbit-out-of-the-hat" glovehand saves which left the Jet's forwards slack-jawed in amazement.

"Tweedle played an excellent game. He held us close when we just seemed to run out of gas in that last period," commented Flyer's coach Ken Morrison. "And those penalties didn't help us one bit." Looking at other individual performances, Morrison said, "That Six Nations line of W-

dell Martin, Paul Henhawk and Bob Powless was exceptionally good tonight. They stood out above everyone else to night on the forward lines. On defense, Ross McKeen, Paul McCarthy and Roger Montour played well for their first time out. Brian Whitwell and Don Brown (both hopeful newcomers and defense-men) seemed to play better when we paired them with an experienced defenseman."

On the scoresheet, Tom Lyne led the Jet's attack with two goals, while Chris White, Jeff O'Donnell and Don Kendrick counted singletons. For Hagersville, Paul Henhawk, Paul Townsend and John Montour scored. Simcoe held period leads of 3-1 and 4-3 on their way to the win.

The Jet's goaltending duo of George Wallace and Mike Pearce combined for a 28 stop performance. Wallace gave up all three Flyer goals over the first two periods. Hagersville goal-

ies Bill Downey and Dick Tweedle blocked 37 Simcoe drives. Downey yielded three of the Simcoe tallies, but was the victim of sloppy defensive play which left him virtually alone on those three occasions. Tweedle gave up the last two goals over the final 30 minutes of play, but turned in a 20 stop performance in the final stanza.

Asked what he was looking to improve, Morrison quipped, "The score. But first we have to quit scrambling, play our positions, and pick up our checks. Also we have to cut down on the number of penalties. Tonight we were perhaps too aggressive, and we took a lot of unnecessary penalties." Game time in Ohsweken against Simcoe Friday night is 8 p.m.

ICE CHIPS: Tony Yacubino's uncomplicated remarks to the referee earned him a major misconduct penalty and a trip to the showers halfway through the third period on Sunday. Yacubino must now sit out the first three league games - the result of a one game suspension carried over from last season, plus the automatic two games for the last major misconduct.

The Flyers had at least six players out of Sunday's lineup due to injury. Coalie Dick Tweedle is also trying out with the Simcoe Jets. Bill Downey was the winner of the first annual Flyer's golf tournament held recently at the Sundrind Golf Club on Highway 6.

Flyer's coach Ken Morrison still has to make at least 10 cuts to get down to the desired 20 players. Hagersville still has four goalkeepers in camp - Tweedle and Downey, Kirk Brown and Bill Burke.

Over 100 Hagersville fans travelled to Simcoe last Sunday to watch and cheer the Flyers.

## Christian Education In Jarvis


