Firemen Called

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen received two calls this past week. The first was received at 8:25 p.m. on Thursday, October 11. A barn owned by Mark LaForme on the Indian Line, New Credit of the Mississauga Reserve, was completely gutted, with the cause of the

fire still remaining unknown. Firemen responded to this call during dense foggy conditions.

On Sunday, October 14 at 8:20 a.m., the fire-fighting crew was called to the property of Doug Burke, R.R. 3, Hagersville, situated on Highway 6. There at the extreme rear of the property the owner had numerous piles of brush, old trees, stumps etc., burning, to clear the property of rubbish.

Due to the windy conditions, this was causing some concern. Therefore, the call was placed to the local firemen. Upon their arrival at the scene, all the fires were quickly extinguished, following their difficulty in reaching the rear of the farm where the fires were in progress.

TO ALL CONCERNED - The Fire Chief asks everyone to abstain from burning rubbish, brush, grass, etc., until this extremely dry season is over with the autumn rains. Remember, these out-of-hand aforementioned fires DO cost the Townships a fair amount of money.

History Of Hagersville

Therefore the Municipal Council of the County of Haldimand in Council assembled enacts:

1. That the said village and neighborhood and the inhabitants residing within the said village and limits hereinafter mentioned, shall be and they are hereby erected, declared, set apart and constituted into an incorporated village, and the said village and neighborhood, and the inhabitants thereof, shall be and they are hereby declared and constituted a Municipality separate and set apart from the said Municipalities of Walpole and Oneida.

2. That the name of the said village and neighborhood shall be "The Incorporated Village of Hagersville."

3. That the boundaries of the said incorporated village shall be as follows, that is to say: Commencing at the north west angle of lot number fourteen in the thirteenth concession of the said Township of Walpole, thence south fifteen degrees and forty minutes east, sixteen chains and twenty-three links to a boundary set as the westerly limit of the Stone Quarry premises, thence bounding thereon north twenty-seven degrees and thirty minutes east, seven chains and eight links to a stake set at the north-west angle of said Stone Quarry premises, thence south fifty-eight degrees east, passing through a small wild cherry tree and a small red oak, etc., trees, eighteen chains and eighty links to a boundary set, thence south twenty-four degrees east, ten chains to a stake set in the northerly limit of the right of way of the Canada Southern Railway, and south east angle of said Stone Quarry premises; thence bounding on said northerly limit of said

right of way north seventy-four degrees and twelve minutes east, or thereabouts, three chains and forty-two links to where said right of way widens both north and south easterly therefrom; thence south fifteen degrees and forty-five minutes east, crossing said Southern Railway two chains and forty-six links, to the south west angle of said Railway; thence south twenty degrees, and fifteen minutes east (crossing the Hamilton and North Western Railway) thirty-four chains and fifty links more or less to the point of intersection of the easterly side of the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road, with the northerly limit of the allowance for road in front of the Thirteenth Concession of the said Township of Walpole; thence bounding on the northerly limit of said road allowance, north seventy-nine degrees east, twenty-four chains and eighty links to the north east angle of Block No. 6, in the David Almas survey of Park Lots, part of the southern division of lot number fifteen in said Thirteenth Concession of Walpole; thence parallel to the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road, north thirty-four degrees and thirty minutes east, twenty-four chains and sixty-seven links more or less to the northerly limits of the established road along the Indian Line; thence parallel to said Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road, north thirty-four degrees and eighty-two links more or less to the northerly limit of township lot number twenty-nine on the east side of the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road in the Township of Oneida; thence bounding on said limit north, sixty-two degrees and thirty minutes east, thirty-nine chains and seventy-four links more or less to the northerly limit of the allowance of the road, along the Indian Line, at the south west angle of lot number thirty-six; thence bounding along the northerly limit of said Indian Line road (or King Street) south sixty-two degrees and thirty minutes west, fifty-five chains and forty-eight links more or less, to the line with the southerly side of the allowance for road in front of the Fourteenth Concession of Walpole, and thence in line with and along said southerly side of said allowance for road, south seventy-nine degrees west, eleven chains more or less to the place of beginning, and being composed of the northerly and easterly part of township lot number fourteen, the great part of township lot number fifteen, and the north-westerly part of township lot number sixteen, all in the Thirteenth Concession of the said Township of Walpole, in the said County of Haldimand; also the westerly part of township lot numbers twenty-nine and thirty, both on the easterly side of the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank, and also township lots numbers twenty-nine and thirty, both on the easterly side of the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road, all in the said Township of Oneida, in the said County of Haldimand, containing in all inclusive of streets and roads, by a measurement three hundred and thirty-four acres of land.

That the first election shall be held at the Opera House, in the said Village of Hagersville, and that David J. Almas junior, shall be the returning officer, who shall hold the same.

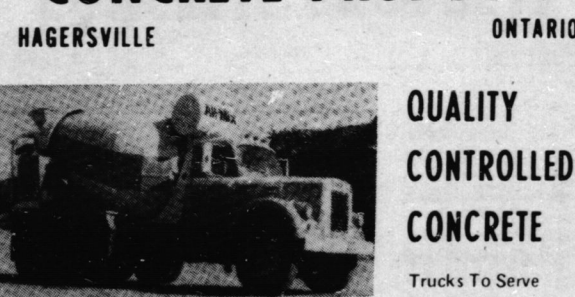
