would not make any difference in regional grants, but it would in road grants. "Cities" receive less subsidy than "towns" and "townships."

County council plans to hold a meeting with Mr. Warner and representatives of the Ministry of Transportation and Communication to clarify the matter further.

It is expected "City of Nanticoke" will have a change in name if possible.

Also at council:

\* Mr. Benner told council Roger Warner said elections are definitely set for December 10th.

\* Robert Gordon of Caledonia questioned whether local municipalities would receive direct benefits from the

industrial complex located along the lake-shore. Are we going to provide all the housing and get no taxation at the local level? he asked.

Bruce Meehan, deputy-reeve of Walpole suggested that 50 per cent of Caledonia's residents work in Hamilton and Caledonia doesn't receive any taxation benefits from them.

After talking with Mr. Warner, clerk Benner reported there won't be any direct benefit to the local municipalities from the industry, but they will benefit through the duties the region takes over and pays for.

\* County council approved a motion recommending the new region comprising Haldimand and Norfolk counties come under the Hamil-

ton district of the Ministry of Transportation and Communication.

At present, engineers come from Burlington to work with Haldimand County, while Norfolk

works through the London division.

Deputy-reeve of Walpole, Bruce Meehan said Norfolk has already recommended the region come under London.

small compared to the H-N territory. Therefore, he would pick the Haldimand - Norfolk name.

THOMAS WRIGHT of R. R. 1 Jarvis would like to see Erie as the new name for the region comprising Haldimand and Norfolk counties.

Mr. Wright explained that the area between the Stone Church and St. Anne's Catholic Church used to be called Erie.

But now, there is not too much left in the area, so he would pick Erie as the region name.

ROBERT WILLIS says the region name doesn't make that much difference to him, but he would prefer Erie.

MRS. O. WILLIAMSON prefers Haldimand-Norfolk because it is a name she can identify with.

MRS. A. WESTERHUIS favors the name Erie because the region is close to Lake Erie and it sounds better. She feels Haldimand-Norfolk is quite a mouthful. It would be better to get away from the names that are already there and have a new name for the new region, she said. And, since we are close to the lake, Erie sounds logical.

MRS. M. WALKER chose the Haldimand-Norfolk label to stick with a home name.

MRS. H. KROUSE prefers the Erie name because Lake Erie bounds both the counties.

MR. F. WILSON prefers Haldimand-Norfolk for the region name because it seems more

appropriate than Erie since these are the names already being used in the area.

MRS. L. MONTAGUE says she will go along with whatever name is decided upon.

MRS. LORNE PETERSON said the region name doesn't make any difference to her or her husband.

MR. A. LUNDY said he would like the new region to be Haldimand only because he likes the county and doesn't feel Norfolk has anything to offer Haldimand.

MRS. F. WALKER said Haldimand-Norfolk would be her choice.

He said tenders called for the construction of the \$200 million plus refinery must be received by the first week in December. It will take a further two weeks to analyze bids, he explained, but the company hopes to begin construction in the early part of '74.

Construction time for the plant which will have a capacity of 95,000 barrels a day will be approximately two years, he said, . . . subject to such setbacks as any strikes, etc. At present, all refineries in Canada are working at their capacity, he added.

Mr. Bertrand, who lives in Montreal, has been with Texaco for 15 years and is a former Montreal Alouette and Ottawa Roughrider football player.

Harold Nie, Haldimand Plowmen's Association president, Haldimand Warden Lorna Miller, Agriculture representative Ken Best, Bob Ferguson, reeve of Oneida, and Blake Gloyd, reeve of Rainham, were just a few of the head table members to speak to the crowded hall.

"I hope the next plowing match isn't on April 1st when all the rural people get plowed under," Mr. Gloyd said, in reference to the implementation date for regional government in Haldimand and Norfolk.

## Education Notes

The Haldimand County Board of Education approved the acceptance of tenders for repair work on the roof of the Hagersville Secondary School.

At their October 16th meeting, the Board accepted the Culp Construction base bid of \$15,000 plus -

(a) major blisters patched with 4-ply felt and re-pour at \$14.68 per linear yard.

(b) major blisters patched with 2-ply felt and re-pour at \$11.77 per linear yard.

(c) minor blisters patched with 2-ply felt and re-pour at \$7.15 per linear yard.

Also at the meeting: \* It was reported the gymnasium of the Walpole South School has been restored with the exception of draperies. It was gutted by fire (started by vandals) June 7th.

\* The Parkview School addition is complete, except for minor deficiencies.

\* The Board approved a recommendation that the salaries of three bus drivers who are employed by them and drive the Haldimand School

\* The Board approved a recommendation that bussing be arranged for Kindergarten and grade eight pupils from the Northview area in Hagersville, who have been transferred to the Parkview School. This bussing will be limited to pick-ups and discharges only at Northview School with no stops inbetween.

\* The Board discussed bussing costs for Haldimand County School children.

Chairman Don Duxbury said he was against tendering for bussing carriers. He doesn't feel transportation should be put in the hands of outside operators. Pricing with local carriers is very competitive, he said.

Essex and Victoria, which are comparable with Haldimand, have costs of \$76 and \$67 per pupil respectively.

\* The Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Washburn, has material at his disposal concerning V.D. instruction to secondary pupils. This material will be under review by Secondary School Principals.

A chart of county bussing costs in Ontario ranged from \$15 per pupil in '72 in counties with many urban centres to \$167 in scarcely populated counties. Haldimand's cost was \$52 per pupil in 1972.

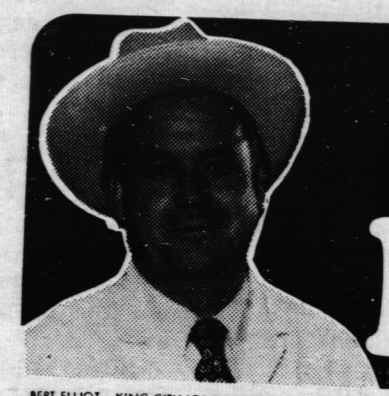
