Flyers Lose Second Exhibition Outing

The Hagersville Junior D Flyers lost their second consecutive exhibition game last Friday night in Ohsweken - a 5-2 decision to the Simcoe Junior C Jets in another robust display of pre-season hockey. The same two clubs met in an earlier exhibition contest, with the Jets coming out on top 5-3 in a penalty-studded affair.

Hagersville now prepares for a home and home exhibition series against the Norwich Junior D Merchants. The Flyers will host the Merchants in Ohsweken at 8 p.m. this Friday, October 26th, and then travel to Norwich for a 2 p.m. encounter on Sunday, October 28th. Hagersville will open their 73-74 league schedule in Watford on Tuesday, October 30th at 8:15 p.m.

"I'm glad things got switched around from the game in Simcoe," commented Jet's coach Don Stewart in reference to the more than 50 penalties assessed in that initial game. "They settled down and played hockey tonight."

Asked for his impressions of the Hagersville club, Stewart said, "I'm most impressed with their size. Certainly the Flyer's defence plays tough in their own end. You pay for touching the puck in the corners and in front of the net. Once they stop running around, they're going to be all right."

It was two third period powerplay goals that

turned the tide in Simcoe's favour in Ohsweken. With the Jet's holding a 3-2 lead, and Hagersville playing two men short, Tom Lyne had plenty of time to score his second of the night. Twenty-five seconds later, with the Flyers still playing one man short, Don Kendrick put the game out of reach for Hagersville with a tip-in behind Hagersville's Bill Burke to give the Jet's their final three goal edge. In addition to Lyne's first goal of the game, other Jet scorers were Chris White and Mark Cowan.

Hagersville goalkeepers were Bob Powless and Paul Henhawk.

After playing a scoreless first stanza, Simcoe carried a 2-1 edge into the final period.

The Flyers iced Kirk Brown and Bill Burke in goal, with Brown giving up one goal against 18 stops. Burke allowed four goals against 20 saves. Simcoe's goal-tending duo of George Wallace and Mike Pearce combined for a 40 save performance.

"I was satisfied with our goaltending," said Flyer's coach Ken Morrison. "We ran into that rash of penalties in the last period, and Simcoe scored two powerplay goals. That fourth goal was the real killer."

Added Morrison, "Our defence played fairly well, and the whole team skated well for the first two periods and picked up their checks."

Commenting on hoped for improvement areas, the Hagersville mentor explained, "Right now, we haven't got too much polish around the opposition's net. We had plenty of good scoring opportunities, but just couldn't finish them off. We're wasting too many rushes trying to go through too many men."

Asked for his choice of Flyer's standouts in last Friday's game, Morrison replied,

We've still got a lot of work to do before anyone will stand out on this club."

ICE CHIPS: Flyer defenceman Ross McKeen was a major combatant in last Friday's contest on two occasions. The second bout in the same game costs him an automatic misconduct penalty and a game suspension, to be served the first league game.

Flyer's Ron Foster played in a Jet's uniform last Friday, and at the time of this writing continues to work out with them.

Glen Hewson was on the sidelines for last Friday's game with a charley-horse suffered during the contest in Simcoe.
