Stelco To Begin Tree Planting Soon

Stelco is "just getting ready" to go out for bids on a landscaping project for their Nanticoke and this phase would begin in the fall.

It is possible that this may come out at the site, Ross Robertson, liaison officer for the company, told the Rec-ord Thursday.

At a meeting in Port Dover at the end of March, the company an-nounced plans for scenic roadways, rolling landscape and small wood-lots integrated with steel making facilities for the Lake Erie site.

They have been tear-ing down buildings, cutning Associates, consultant for Stelco, said autumn would be the best time for tree planting as wells in the area which will be developed first.

"Before the end of this year, we expect to have finalized our plans as the steelmaking technology employed at this location," he said.

"It might even be next week," a public re-lations spokesman told the Record Thursday. "We really don't know, but we expect it before the end of the year." He could not give any definite date because no announcement has been made by Stelco executives.
