Bits 'n Pieces SHOTS

Pre-school children should receive immunization against measles, rubella and mumps long before school entry, Dr. H. H. Washburn of the Haldimand-Norfolk Unit says.

In a letter to the Record, he pointed out that "this is the age group which suffers most from these diseases and from the complications. In this day and age, with such good vaccines and antigins, no child should really have to endure the diseases or the complications thereof."

The medical officer said the responsibility of keeping up a child's immunity lies with the parents. Once the child reaches school age, the local health unit moves into the picture and the children are vaccinated - with the parents permission - and a chart is kept on each child.

HOSPITAL BUDGET

Continued constraints in the hospital sector will be in effect throughout fiscal 1974/75, Ontario Health Ministry officials revealed last week. However, the tough 5 per cent increase allowed for the current year has been modified. Hospitals, including the West Haldimand General Hospital, may start preparing 1974 operating budgets on the basis of an increase not exceeding 7.9 per cent of the 1973 approved maximum allowable net operating costs.

In a letter to all chairman of boards and administrators of hospitals. Deputy Minister S. W. Martin commended hospitals for their co-operation in assisting the Ministry in its attempts to reverse the sharp escalation in the cost of providing health services
