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governmental Affairs told members a timetable target of September 15th would be best because a later date (eg. Oct.) would preclude Jan. 1st for implementation and perhaps April 1st.

Norfolk County Council approved the beginning of the new year for implementation of regional government, but Haldimand rejected it because they felt it did not give the two counties enough time. They voted for July 1st instead.

John White, minister of Intergovernmental Affairs, has set no definite date, although he has indicated he may favor a compromise of April 1st.

Before September 15th, the Local Steering Committees must decide:

- * all internal boundaries. The basic premise is that Nigel Richardson's recommendations in the Haldimand-Norfolk Study report are the working boundary lines. Negotiations for boundary changes by the Steering Committee must be geared to minor adjustments only. The Joint Study Committee will arbitrate any disputes. If no settlement can be agreed on, John White will be asked to make a decision.

- * size of local councils.

- * how the councils are to be elected - wards or by voting at large.

- * name for local municipalities.

Also by September 15th, the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee, on recommendations from local steering committees, must decide:

- * the political responsibility for functions effective at the date of implementation of the new local government.
- * the number of members to represent each of the six new proposed local municipalities.
- * the name of the region.

Each Local Steering Committee reported on their plans for the immediate future at the Wednesday meeting.

Craig Stewart, reeve of Townsend and chairman for the Nanticoke Creek region reported that boundaries lines had been agreed upon, except for the area between Hagersville, Selkirk and Simcoe. Selkirk residents are making their own choice, he said. And, he said there would be further discussion on the boundary proposed for Hagersville, which he indicated was a little large. There is also a bit of conflict over the Simcoe boundary, he said.

The steering committee agreed to use the ward system and the municipality should be named Nanticoke, "leaving the creek to run by itself."

Gordon Miller, reeve of Walpole, told the Study Committee there

wasn't enough time to get everything done by Sept. 15.

The municipality of Nanticoke (Jarvis, Walpole, Woodhouse, Waterford, Townsend, Port Dover) will be meeting in the Jarvis-Walpole municipal building on Sept. 11.

Ken Best, reeve of Cayuga and chairman of the Central Haldimand municipality, suggested other local councils with regional government experience be contacted. And, he requested an extension of the September 15th date.

Central Haldimand Hagersville, Oneida, Seneca, Cayuga, North Cayuga, South Cayuga, Caledonia) will meet in the Cayuga Administration building September 5th and 12th.

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"see us rounding out annual capacity at our Hilton Works basic steel plant in Hamilton at somewhere around six million tons."

"This pretty well represents the maximum growth that can take place at this location because of space limitations," he said.

With the rounding out of capacity at Hilton Works, Mr. Henault said the company will become the first major steel producer to undertake a greenfield steel-making development.

6,600 acres of land was purchased by the company west of Nanticoke five years ago.

The development of a greenfield site poses major problems and risks for the steel-maker, he said.

"Quite apart from the huge capital investment required (up to \$2 billion) - particularly in the current era of high inflation and skyrocketing construction costs - a steel maker embarking on this type of venture also faces the spectre of creating excess capacity and consequently costly under-utilization of facilities," he explained.

But, it appears to be "Stelco's destiny to move into these treacherous and uncharted waters," he added.

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before the end of 1973. The reason for favoring the new year implementation is to save "untold work" which would be caused by a mid-year beginning.

If elections can go through by December, there will be no trouble with carryover and transfer of accounts, Dave Wilson, clerk of Walpole, explained.

However, an April 1st or July 1st date would require a budget set up for part of '74. And, all subsidies and debentures would have to be considered and appointed to different bodies before and after the implementation date. A second audit would also have to be taken.

If a ward system were adopted by a municipality, this would require a different tax system. The book work change and rearrangement of accounts would place a heavy work load on the clerks.

Mr. Wilson explained to the Record that the Ministry of Intergovernmental Affairs requested the clerks and treasurers to meet together and discuss the situation.

This request by the province is the only reason administrative people of the county met; and not to interfere with the elected officials' decisions, Mr. Wilson said. And, the meeting was cleared through all reeves and their permission was obtained.

Fall Forage

Legume meadows must be rested during the autumn to ensure good stands and top yields next year, says R. S. Fulkerson, crop scientist, Ontario Agricultural College, University of Guelph.

Cutting or grazing should not take place on top quality legume meadows during September or October in south-western Ontario, if these meadows are to get the rest they require. This rest permits alfalfa and other forages to store sugars in their roots protecting the plant against low winter temperatures. This process must be completed before heavy frosts have killed the leaves, making a rest during September - October essential.

Cattle must, however, be fed during this autumn period. Here are some suggestions for planning your forage program.

Each year farmers plough run out meadows. These are the meadows that should provide the cattle feed during the autumn rest period. So don't cut or graze these meadows during the late summer. Let them grow

and use them for feed during the autumn when the best hay and pasture meadows are being rested.

Another feed alternative is to undergraze a pasture or hay meadow during the critical harvest period. This undergrazing will permit the plants to build up food reserves so they will better withstand winter conditions.

In late October or November, meadows with knee-high growth can be lightly browsed. But don't take off all the growth. Leave a foot or more of top growth. It will hold the snow, prevent icing, and keep the soil warm. Such top growth is good insurance against winterkill.

Legume meadows may be severely injured if cut or grazed near the critical fall harvest date (September). Since this date varies across the province, farmers should consult Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food publication 296, Field Crop Recommendations, or contact their local agricultural representative, to find out the critical harvest date for their areas.

There's Do-it-Yourself Business L.I.P., too, for companies which want to provide facilities or services for their communities. Projects are not to be related to business operations, and must create additional jobs.
