Helen Miller gave a humorous reading. Mrs. Charles Powell auctioned the food and extended courtesy.

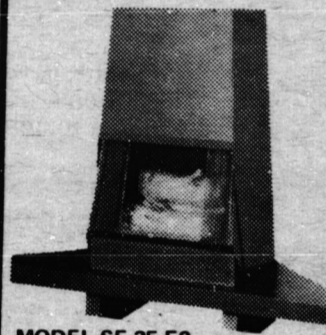
