Computer Guidance Information Service At H.S.S.

"In the past, under slow rates of change, with stable and familiar subcultures, our children were provided with basic vocational and social skills that could last them a lifetime. Counsel was provided for the few who lived on the fringe of these stable systems by clergy, family doctors, understanding magistrates and teachers. These counsellors had pretty reliable images of the relevant past, present and future. . . Now, however, in the 70's, increasing change and rising levels of uncertainty make it increasingly difficult not just for the minority but for the majority of us to generate reasonably reliable images of even the near future, and so it becomes difficult to build stable yet made it increasingly difficult for the student to choose his future educational path confidently. Similarly, guidance counsellors find they are forced to spend more and more of their time looking up and checking information and less and less time in one-to-one discussions.

In addition to the burgeoning information on educational opportunities there is also an increasing number of careers and occupations on which to keep up to date. New occupations and careers are being created every day in our rapidly advancing technological society and little information is available to students on these new opportunities

nor has it been possible to keep up with the changes in the established occupations. The new computer information service being formed this fall at Hagersville Secondary School will operate along the following lines: Basically, the computerized data base contains four types of information. These are career, institution, courses and programs, and educational requirements (training) information. The career information was compiled by data base authors with many years of experience in the field of guidance counselling. The career write-ups were prepared through careful considerations of actual careers as existing in Canada, consultations with "live" career people, and the use of such sources as Canadian Classification and Dictionary of Occupations (CCDO - Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration), Horizons (Ministry of Colleges & Universities), Occupation Monographs, Spectrum (Guidance Centre, OCE), and Dictionary of Occupational Titles (U.S. Department of Labour). Approximately 7,000 career descriptions are in the data base.

At present the data base includes information on the 16 Ontario Universities, Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology, all of Ontario's 58 Schools of Nursing, Ontario's Apprenticeship Programs,

The above is taken from a recent report on school guidance by the Commission on Post-Secondary Education in Ontario. This September, Hagersville Secondary School will offer a computer information service. This will give students access to current information on about 7,000 careers and 200 post-secondary schools and institutions. An individual may submit questions and receive in a short time a computer print-out using the latest information available to the data bank located at the Ministry of Education in Toronto.

This service is called Student Guidance Information Service (SGIS). Why is this service being offered? Opportunities for post-secondary education in Ontario are increasing to the point where it is becoming extremely difficult, if not impossible, for any one individual to keep up with the changes. The multiplicity of institutions and courses has 25 Private Trade Schools, Hairdressing Schools and Schools of Agricultural Technology, as well as the Ontario College of Art, Ryerson, University of Manitoba and McGill.

The total number of institutions described and on computer file is over 150. Extension of the data base is theoretically unlimited, due to its open-ended type of construction.

What kind of information will SGIS provide? Perhaps the best way to answer this question is to list the questions or requests which students are most likely to have when they use the service. SGIS will provide answers to these questions or requests; examples of which are as follows: - What is career X all about? - What careers are related to (i.e. similar) or specializations of career X? - Generally what is institution X like? - What are the educational requirements for career X? - I know what career I want to pursue, but where can I get the necessary training? - What are the specific courses I would take to train me for career X? - All I need for the admission requirements (or other specific item) for these institutions. Will you provide me with just that information?

Please send me a list of all institutions offering X type of program. Where can I get training for career X in geographical area X. - Please keep me informed on all changes that might occur in program X at institution X.

Nanticoke Creek Area Favors Haldimand - Norfolk Name

The "Regional Municipality of Haldimand and Norfolk" is the name favored by the Nanticoke Creek Steering Committee for the new two county region.

The Nanticoke Creek area, comprising Jarvis, Waterford, Port Dover, Walpole twp., Woodhouse twp., and Townsend twp. will recommend this name to the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee at their next meeting. Also at the Tuesday, Sept. 11th meeting, the committee agreed upon the following recommendations being made to the H.N.J.S.C.:

The Haldimand-Norfolk region should have an 18 member council, with four representatives from Nanticoke Creek; three representatives each from the proposed area municipalities of Simcoe, Central Norfolk and Central Haldimand and two representatives each from the area municipalities of West Norfolk and East Haldimand. This is based on a rep by pop formula. O.P.P. should take over police services,

with existing police forces to be phased into the O.P.P. as soon as possible. The Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study's report on planning, public works, recreation, finances, health and social services, finances and administration, licensing and inspection were approved. (See Central Haldimand story for breakdown of each).
