**Flyers Open Season Nov. 4**

The Hagersville Flyers will play their first home game November 4th at 7:30 against the Ancaster Shamrocks. This was decided at a league meeting last week.

The schedule was drawn up with the Flyers having 15 home dates and the same number of away games. All games will be played at home on Sunday nights, with four exceptions. There will be a Wednesday night game at home on Dec. 19th and a Wednesday afternoon game on December 26th against Norwich.

Hagersville will host Norwich, Delhi and St. George three times while playing them away from home just twice. This looks like the first bit of juggling by the new manager. The Flyers will also be out of town two Sundays, December 30th and Feb. 3rd.

The sale of season tickets have been moving along quite well with Earl Smith handling the job. The price has now been set at \$15.00 for a season ticket and as soon as they are printed Mr. Smith will notify the people involved as to where to pick them up. There has been 75 out of a possible 93 seats sold. The arena has agreed to make a few alterations to the arena, with the biggest one being the enlargement of the players bench.

It is hoped two doors will be provided for both benches and a walkway installed behind the bench for the coach to walk on.

There will be a meeting at the Hagersville Legion on Wed. Sept. 26th at 7:30 p.m. with all players hoping to try out for the team asked to be present. They will get a chance to meet the executive at this time and some of the club's policies will be discussed. **A Look At Business Magic Mart**



Convenience stores are popping up all over the country in response to a growing demand for service after regular store hours.

Jarvis' Magic Mart, managed by Mary Mitchell for the past two years, is one such store.

The Magic Mart, which handles every-

thing through milk, drug items, desserts and cigarettes, is a subsidiary of Town and Country (chain of food stores) in Simcoe.

Mrs. Mitchell told Record the store gets most of the business after supper, but it does have quite a few steady customers. It employs

three people on a part-time basis. Some of the prices are higher (because the store is open extra hours) she said, but not that much higher. And, in some cases, prices are similar because food chain bargains have to be compensated by higher prices on other products.

The Magic Mart building, which at one time housed Dr. Jaques drug store, was a mini mart and variety store before it was taken over by Town and Country.

What about the future? "I really can't say," Mrs. Mitchell said. If a shopping plaza comes to the area, she does not feel there would be much expansion.
