Mr. White has not made any announcement concerning the city location, except to say it would not come before the expiring date of the Walpole-Townsend site options.

At Friday's meeting, Bruce Meehan, deputy-reeve of Walpole, asked county council if they had made any report or decision concerning the city site, pointing out there is a great dollar difference in land costs. Also, people have questioned him concerning county action. Several councillors spoke in favor of the Walpole-Townsend site. Robert Gordon of Cal-

edonia feared the Port Dover - Simcoe area would evolve into a mass city, similar to the Metro Toronto area. He also felt the consortium site would be more beneficial for Caledonia, Cayuga, Hagersville and Jarvis because they could hook into water and sewer lines more easily.

John McCombs of Moulton township said the consortium had done a good job in amassing a land bank, but he did not feel qualified to assess which site was better. Gordon Miller, reeve of Walpole, also spoke in favor of the Townsend site.

Mr. Miller and Mr. Meehan both own land under option by the consortium.

Mr. Miller left the council chambers when John McCombs and Keith Richardson, reeve of Dunn, made a motion favoring the site near Jarvis, while Mr. Meehan refrained from voting.

Neither men declared any possible conflict of interest during the morning discussion.

Twp. which have the same "geographical scope and community of interest."

Ward 2 - consisting of areas north of the Rainham Road in the present townships of Walpole (that portion of Concession 2 not included in ward 1) together with Concession 3-8 inclusive; Woodhouse (that part on Con. 2 not included in Ward 1) together with concession 3-6 inclusive; and Townsend (Concession 14), subject to the same "geographic scope and community of interest."

However, Mr. Gedy said he did not see why everytime business comes up, council has to set up a committee of townspeople. He pointed out the village already has a fire committee to deal with the matter. "And, that's what we're here for..." he said.

Norm Crawford, deputy-reeve, told council the fire chief agreed with Mr. Gedy. The village has a fire committee and a fire

department. If another committee is set up, the issue will just get further away from this table, he said.

Mr. Gedy recommended council spend \$5,000, allotted in the budget for renovation of the present fire hall, for installing facilities in the building.

\* Council approved donating \$1,000 toward the cost of putting of a new fence around the tennis court. The H.A.A.A. contributed \$500, leaving the balance of the \$2,500 total to be paid by the tennis club.

## This Week In Ottawa

### Immigration Policy

Manpower and Immigration Minister Robert Andras announced the creation of a new immigration policy to respond to the rapid changes in migration and population trends in Canada.

A special task force has been appointed to study policy options and to organize the whole review process under the chairmanship of R. M. Tait.

The Minister has invited the provincial governments and private organizations to assist the task force in its work. A "Green Paper," to be published next spring, will serve as a basis for public discussion and as a basis for legislation to be presented to Parliament as soon as possible.

**Controls Lifted**  
Export controls im-

posed by the Canadian Government on meat and livestock have been relaxed.

Beef, pork and livestock can be exported freely from Canada to any country except Rhodesia effective September 15 under two new general export permits.

The export control measures, imposed August 13, were directly related to the market distortions caused by supply and price pressures on Canadian meat production resulting from the beef freeze in the United States. Since the price freeze was lifted in the U.S. September 9, pork, beef and livestock are moving under a more normal supply/demand relationship.

**Liberal Meeting**  
Some 2500 delegates gathered in Ottawa last weekend for the Liberal Party of Canada Convention. Senator Gil Molgat of Manitoba was elected the new President, replacing Senator Richard J. Stanbury, President of the Party for the past five and a half years.

**Native Peoples**  
Secretary of State

Hugh Faulkner told the Canadian Association in Support of the Native Peoples to undertake to educate white people about native peoples and their problems.

He said native people must now solve their own problems; they can't be solved by government departments or by voluntary associations.

**Exports Drop**  
Exports to the United States in August decreased to \$1.8 billion from \$2.1 billion in July. Statistics Canada reported that preliminary information suggests the country-wide railway strike had a sharp impact on the reduced shipments to the U.S.
