**Bantams Lose First Game To Thamesville**

The Hagersville Legion Bantams lost their first game of the O.B.A. finals to Thamesville on Sunday afternoon by a score of 9-3. This was the first action for the Legion team in three weeks and it really showed as they committed four errors in the field, plus several mental errors. Three times Hagersville had runners picked off base and twice at second. Manager Nat Salvatore feels the boys can bounce back, but that they will have to play heads up ball - something they failed to do in this game.

In the first inning, Mike Liscombe led off with a base hit and promptly stole second. Mike then moved to third on an infield out. Darrell Watson hit a long shot to right field and Liscombe took off for home. When the fielder caught the ball, Liscombe had to go back and tag up and by this time it was too late to score. This seemed to set the pattern for the remainder of the game. Thamesville scored in the bottom of the second without a base hit. Two

walks and an error accounted for the run. Hagersville tied the score in the top of the 4th. Mike Montour led off with a single and stole second. Ralph Awde hit a shot at first base that Badder couldn't handle as Montour scored. Thamesville got two back in the bottom of the 4th as Billy Winger walked the first man he faced. Badder, the heavy hitting first baseman, cracked a homerun for a 3-2 lead.

The Legion crew narrowed the gap in the top of the 5th, but some poor base running killed a rally. Liscombe started the inning with this second hit of the day. Terry Crawford walked to put two men on and no-one out. Liscombe then got picked off base for the first out of the inning. Richard Salvatore laid down a perfect bunt that the third baseman threw away in an attempt to get the speedy Salvatore racing to first. Crawford scored on the play, but it would have been a couple of runs and still no one out. But, Hagersville came up with only one run.

In the bottom of the inning, Thamesville got that run back without too much trouble. A walk, single and an error made it 4-2. Winger walked the lead off batter in the 6th and the third baseman Patterson cracked a homerun to make it 6-2. They put the game on ice in the 7th after two were out. A single and two walks loaded the bases. The home team got the first real break of

the game at this point. Badder blooped a Texas leaguer out just behind short, that Salvatore couldn't reach. It took a high hop over his head and all three runners scored. Badder would have scored too, but he missed first base and had to go back and tag the bag.

Hagersville scored their final run in the top of the 9th. Hal Brown reached first on an error. Brian Speller went in to run for him. Winger got his second hit of the game, but he too was picked off second. Randy Strohm pinch hit for Crawford and came through with a single, scoring Speller. Phil Nie was the only

other player to hit safely for Hagersville.

Winger pitched a strong game, allowing six hits, five walks and striking out 10. Four of the five walks scored, all 'g with the five unearned runs. If Winger pitches as well this Sunday and his mates can play heads up ball, we may still see a winner in town this year. Along with the Caledonia Midgets these are the only two teams in Southern Counties having a chance for an O.B.A. title. Game time is 2 p.m. on Sunday, so lets get out to the park and give the team some support. They can and will play a lot better with some fan support.

**John Bothwell To Be Installed  
Anglican Bishop Of Niagara**

At 4 p.m. on September 30 John Bothwell, following an aged-old tradition, will march up to the doors of Christ's Church Cathedral in Hamilton, knock several times with the pastoral staff and ask to be admitted.

The September meeting of Faith Centennial U.C.W. took place in the Fellowship Hall on September 12th at 8 p.m. In the absence of the President, Diane Everets, the second vice-president, Marg Freeman, took the chair.

The Call to Worship was a poem entitled "Autumn" by Sir Rabinindranath Tagore, (1861-1941) the metaphical and religious poet and philosopher of India, who saw God in all nature.

The Hymn "For the Beauty of the Earth" in unison was followed by prayer by Marg.

Bishop Bothwell, 47, a native of Toronto, was ordained in 1951 and has served in Toronto, Vancouver, Oakville, Dundas and Hamilton. He was elected Co-adjutor Bishop of Niagara Diocese in April 1971 and was consecrated in June of that year.

Record readers will remember that Bishop Bothwell visited Jarvis early in June.

The Cathedral service will have an ecumenical touch with Rabbi Bernard Baskin of Anshe Sholom Temple, Hamilton, reading from the scriptures, partly in Hebrew, and the Reverend Kenneth Campbell of Burlington, Chairman of the Hamilton Conference of the United Church of Canada, reading the Epistle.

The Gospel will be read by the Most Reverend W. L. Wright, Archbishop of Algoma and Metropolitan of Ontario, and the newly-installed Bishop will preach.
