September is the ideal time for fall application of fertilizer for forage legume crops such as alfalfa and trefoil. In addition these crops should not be cut or grazed for a couple of weeks before and after September 25. Both of these management practices will help to avoid winterkill and provide for a more vigorous and higher yielding crop next year.

According to reports by the Potash Institute of Canada a farmer's time can be worth \$50.00 per hour or more during planting season. A Minnesota study found that a grower with 200 acres of corn could gain \$450.00 more per plant-
