## On The Farm Front

As the new regional and area councils take charge of the municipal affairs of Haldimand-Norfolk, construction on the local industrial sites is about to start. Speculators and/or developers seem to be scouring the countryside looking for land that stands a chance to make them a dollar. The agricultural community can quite naturally wonder about their future in our area.

What follows is speculation based on the best information available, including the assurance from planners that 85 percent of our land will remain in agriculture and that, with only a very few exceptions, we have the best climate for agriculture in Ontario or Canada.

We can assume that world population and the demand for food will continue to climb. Judging from the mood of agricultural producers the price of food will never again be at the low levels of the past.

During the construction phase just ahead, some of our rural people will have an opportunity for more take-home pay than ever before. Some will use this as an opportunity to help pay for the high capital cost involved in agriculture. Labour intensive enterprises like dairying could suffer, if we look at other areas such as Essex and Kent where land prices have been higher than ours for some years, dairying has almost been eliminated. We could end up producing corn, soybeans, wheat and perhaps even white beans and so on.

On some of the lighter soils in the Dunnville area, vegetable production could be even more important in the future.

All of these suppositions assume that we will make use of improved drainage to make sure that our crops can benefit from the relatively good climate that is available.

This is a very long preamble to the suggestion that anyone who intends to farm in our area in the future should have been at drainage night at Canboro on April 2.

Those who missed it should not miss the Soybean Night at Kohler starting at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 10 nor should they miss Corn Night April 22 at Cowan Farm Supply, Dunnville.
