Haldimand Park

The Haldimand County park will be transferred to the Long Point Conservation Authority on the recommendation of the former County Park Board. Their only stipulations were that the property be kept as a park and the name Haldimand Park be maintained.

Regional Roads Engineer

Donald Brooks of Manotick has been engaged as Regional Roads Engineer at a salary of \$21,000 per year. He fills the vacancy left by Ed Coates.

Nanticoke

City of Nanticoke administrative offices will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for those who have business with the municipality.

Planning Committee

City of Nanticoke councillors will be appointing, at their next meeting, one councillor from each ward and three ratepayers from each ward to sit on the planning committee. This will give the committee 12 members.

\$9,000 For Inspectors

Haldimand - Norfolk regional councillors approved salaries of \$9,000 per annum for the carrying out of building inspections in four municipalities.

William Williamson is the building inspector for the Town of Haldimand, earning \$9,000 per year. Walter Cook of Norfolk and W. S. Seaton of Delhi will likewise receive \$9,000 each. In the Town of Dunnville, Bruce McPherson, George Crosby and Cecil Hart will carry out inspections for a combined salary not to exceed \$9,000.

Each will receive fringe benefits and 15 cents per mile travelling expenses in addition to their salary.

A City of Nanticoke inspector has not been appointed yet.

Councillor Salaries

Regional councillors' salaries of \$6,500 will be paid on a monthly basis for the nine months of 1974, Finance and Administration Chairman Fred Peacock informed the Record.

Board of Health

H - N councillors approved the appointment of Lorna Miller as Chairman of the Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Board of Health. John Roxburgh Jr. is the Vice - Chairman and clerk Karl Benner will act as secretary of the Health Board.

Fringe benefits and travel allowance for management personnel of the Board in 1974 has been amended as follows:

Medical Officer of Health, Chief Public Health Inspector, Director of Nursing, Administrator of Home Care Program and Office Manager will receive a travel allowance of \$60 per month and 12 cents per mile except for the Dental Director and Office Manager in which case it is 15 cents per mile without a monthly allowance.

Statutory Holidays have been expanded to include Easter Monday.

below that since the end of Jan. British Columbia is the latest province to introduce a program for hog producers. They are paying \$4.50 per hog subsidy, Alberta has a \$7 per hog subsidy.
