The presiding minister was the Rev. Dr. Neil McDonald of Port Dover Presbyterian Church. Pallbearers were all relatives: Tom Harris, Clayton Speller, Gordon Speller, Clarence Nelson, Carl Reu and Claus Blanchard.

The late Mr. Smith was a native of Walpole township, spending his life until retirement to Port Dover as a farmer in the Jarvis area.

\$6,500 Is Too High

City of Nanticoke area councillors have priced themselves high - too high. At a meeting earlier this month they allotted each \$6,500 - matching their pay with regional councillors' stipend.

The decision gives area councillors \$6,500, regional councillors in Nanticoke \$13,000 and the mayor \$15,000. Taxpayers must pay \$86,500 for the mayor and councillor salaries in Nanticoke alone - not even allowing for the regional figure.

This is more than double the combined salaries (somewhere between \$30,000 and \$40,000) of the 31 municipal men in local office prior to regionalism.

Can we afford it? This \$6,500 figure is even greater than the \$5,700 total paid Mayor, reeve, deputy-reeve and three councillors serving Port Dover in 73.

It is a giant step up from the \$500 to \$1,700 paid former councillors... Or \$3,400 going to the top salaried reeve of Nanticoke in the past.

Granted - These men do have a heavy workload to carry. But, so did Walpole township councillors who dealt with Ontario Hydro, Stelco and Texaco during the past several years. Their combined salaries in 1973 were less than \$10,000.

The argument that they (councillors) will be on 24 hour call doesn't justify such a large increase since they were last year too in their old council seats.

Councillors insist they aren't in it for the money. I'm beginning to wonder. They certainly are taking home greater salaries than many ratepayers in this rural area can boast about... and I wouldn't be surprised if the stipend is larger than some of the councillors' own incomes in the past.

Prior to elections, the suggested area councillor salary hovered around the \$3,000-\$4,000 mark. Nanticoke let the expensive taint of regionalism go to its head (Haldimand's salaries are \$3,200; Dunnville - \$3,700).

I'm certainly not suggesting our councillors should donate their time for nothing, but I don't believe in overpay either. And in my books, \$6,500 is good money for a part-time job. Particularly when I hear of the amount of time some hospital auxiliary, lion, church, sport and farm organization members and leaders put in to serve the community at little or no cost.

To make matters worse, other councils are looking at Nanticoke. Although Haldimand area councillors set their remuneration at \$3,200, there was some comment on local representatives getting less than half of Nanticoke's stipend for what they feel will amount to just as much work.

Nanticoke will undoubtedly be the hub of activity in the near future, but much of the "hub" will be a regional concern. And, its effects will be felt in nearby municipalities.

For sure, \$6,500 for a part-time job should encourage many more candidates in your next election.

The Record was told Tuesday that Treasurer John White would like Haldimand-Norfolk regional council to make a definite decision on where the satellite city should be.

Approximately 11,000 acres near Jarvis, has been optioned by a consortium of developers for this purpose.

An alternate site was recommended in the H-N Joint Study report putting it between Port Dover and Simcoe.

Although Mr. White would like a regional recommendation, he is retaining the right to a final decision.

Regional council meets today (Thursday) in Cayuga.

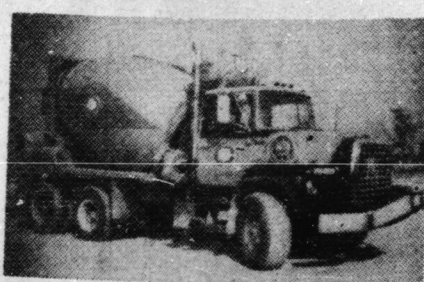
