

Makara Edges Out Brown And Clark For Cayuga Feature Win

Jerry Makara of Ancaster won the Carling Feature Race for Late Model "Super Stock" at Cayuga International Speedway Friday night, with Harold Brown of Brantford and Art Clark of West Seneca, New York taking second and third spots in a blanket finish battle for top honors.

Makara, driving the Bill Beatty built '73 Camaro, shot out of the pack from his 14th place starting position to take 1st place from George Rueffer of Mississauga on lap 7 of the 30 lap feature event, with Brown, driving the Gray's Magnavox '74 Camaro, on his rear bumper by lap 10.

Brown and Makara fought a fierce battle for top spot for the next 20 laps around the 5/8 mile super speedway, with last week's feature winner, Art Clark of West Seneca, New York moving up fast to pose a serious threat in the closing laps. Brown literally pushed Makara's mount down the front straight on the 29th circuit after several frustrated attempts at the lead, as Clark simultaneously made his move for second.

The checkered flag saw Makara ahead by only three feet with Brown on the outside and Clark's '73 Camaro tucked behind Makara's on the inside of Brown looking for an opening. Rounding out the top five were Bill Watson of Toronto in a '73 Firebird and Jim Shipway in fifth place in another '74 Camaro.

Stan Kuwabara of Hamilton powered his rear engine Can Am 3/4 Midget to victory over Bruce "Bullet" Bolitzky in a Sunbeam powered upright in the 20 lap Feature race for the T.Q. Midgets while Randy Slack of Empire Corners took the Mini Stock Feature Event over Stan Pokupiec of Hamilton.

Fifteen races in all were held for the three classes with 37 of the finest NASCAR-Canada sanctioned Late Model "Super Stocks" taking part in eight of the events - 3 twelve car heats, a Trophy Dash, Australian Pursuit Race, two consolation qualifiers and the Carling Feature.

Next week's regular Friday night action should see even more

top drivers added to the program as drivers and crews continue to prepare for the Civic Monday Holiday, August 5th, Export 'A' 200 lap event. The race which has a guaranteed purse of \$13,055, has already attracted NASCAR-Grand National superstar Bobby Allison along with many other top stars.

"As a result," Mr. Woods states, "you have to depend on your own service and these people to build up a reputation for the park and you find that in the first few years you have to take what you get in the way of business."

What the park gets often is group outings (family reunions, church socials, etc.) regular campers (many who leave their trailers there all summer) and often young people (of the campers who are not regulars, Mr. Woods estimates that 50% of them are about 16 to 22 years of age).

The park has recently become part of the Long Point Conservation Authority and while there have been no main changes yet, Mr. Woods says that there are some "in the wind." The L.P.C.A. has only been in Haldimand park since the first of May; the Woods' arriving around the middle of that month.

Up on the hill facing lakeside you have small touches such as children's swings, a little wading pool and a pantheon for (I would suspect) community gatherings.


On the north side of the Lakeshore Road you have space; loads of area for you to park your camper, tent or whatever and to take a walk into the reforested areas filled with birds,

O.P.P. Report

Constable M. Malseed investigated a break, enter and theft occurrence on July 22, 1974 in which culprit(s) entered an unlocked barn in South Cayuga Township, and removed a 4 month old Angus heifer, valued at \$300.00 from its stall and loaded the heifer into some type of vehicle.

Officers investigated two fatalities with two persons killed during the past week. Constable R. Dosman assisted by Corporal E. J. Park investigated a fatality on July 25, 1974, in which Frank Guzzo, 11 Fraser Ave., Hamilton, Ontario, age 55, was fatally injured in a two car collision on Highway #3, Town of Dunnville (Canboro Township). Driver and passenger of other vehicle were also injured and taken to Dunnville Hospital.

Constable R. Adams assisted by Corporal E.J. Park investigated the other fatality on July 27, 1974, in which Fred Amme, R.R.#5, Cayuga, age 20, was fatally injured in a one car collision on #3 Highway, North Cayuga Township. This brings to date a total of eleven fatalities with eleven persons killed for 1974 compared to six fatalities with six persons killed in 1973 during the same period. Twenty-three other motor vehicle collisions were also investigated with nine persons injured.



Driver Pinned In Crash

CAYUGA - Rescuers were more than 30 minutes freeing a man who was trapped inside his overturned car on Saturday of last week.

Fred Amme, 28, of R.R. 5, Cayuga, underwent an emergency operation at Hamilton General Hospital. He has multiple injuries.

Constable Robert Adams of the provincial police at Simcoe, said

Mr. Amme was conscious but in great pain as rescuers tried to free him after the single-car accident on Highway 3, 3 1/2 miles east of Cayuga about 1 a.m.

"We kept talking to him to try to keep his mind off the pain", the policeman said.

"The car roof was smashed right in and it was difficult to get to him. There were only a

few inches between the seats and the roof." Firefighters freed Mr. Amme after moving the car over on its side.

Mr. Amme, believed to have severe abdominal injuries and possible head injuries, was transferred to Hamilton General from Hagersville General Hospital.

He underwent an emergency operation at Hamilton General Hospital last Saturday but died from multiple injuries just a couple of hours later.
