## Union Gas Launches Back To Normal Plan

CHATHAM-- Following the ratification vote announced Tuesday that ended Union Gas Ltd. today launched a "Back-to-Normal" plan designed to "get operations back on a smooth basis as quickly as possible".

Frank Capewell, Operations Vice-President for the Chatham-based utility, said that the Return-to-Normal

operations "will take some time and it may not be possible to resume all services right away."

According to the terms of the Return-to-work agreement which concluded negotiations, unionized employees on the Company Payroll prior to the strike, which was called Feb. 6, will be recalled to work within one week of ratification.

"Assignment priorities are currently being assessed across the company's five regional areas in Southwestern Ontario to determine where manpower is needed most. Depending on these priorities, unionized employees will all be called back to work within the specified week."

"In fact, we expect most employees to be back on the job by this coming weekend," he said.

"Union Gas customers, and the public generally, were extremely patient and understanding during this emergency period. We're hoping that they will continue to be

patient for just a little while longer as it will take some time before we return to day-to-day operations."

Since the strike was called by members of the International Chemical Workers' and the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers' Unions, emergency service and gas supply, maintenance were handled by non-striking supervisory and technical staff.

"And these two jobs were full-time since our work - force was cut by more than half during the strike."

"The strike has left quite a backlog of work. We're really still in early February when it

## Headquarters To Leave Six Nations

The Association of roquios and Allied Indians, voted recently to move its headquarters to the Walpole Island Indian Reserve in Lake St. Clair, from the present site on the Six Nations Reserve.

This vote in favor of the move came during the association's two-day quarterly meeting at the Gibson Reserve, 15 miles west of Bala, about 30 miles north of Brillia.

President of the association, R.L. Hopkins, who represents about 20,000 Indians in ten Ontario bands, said the move is a temporary measure, and a committee has been set up to seek a permanent headquarters. He said, the reason for the move,

is to set up the headquarters closer to his home near Chatham.

Mr. Hopkins was elected to this voluntary non-salaried position for a two-year term last January.

The headquarters of the association, has been in the Six Nations Reserve's Woodland Indian Cultural Education and Research Centre for the last two years.
