## Letter To The Editor

Dear Madam:

I regret very much indeed that the Minister of Natural Resources has decided to open a bow and arrow hunting season for the fall of 1974 in Dufferin County.

There is no shadow of a doubt that bow and arrow hunting exposes the animals concerned to a greater degree of unnecessary suffering than the use of additional firearms. One of the basic reasons for the development of the firearm was to improve the effectiveness of the weapon it replaced, i.e., the bow and arrow. If the bow and arrow had been an effective weapon, the rifle might not exist today.

If anyone chooses to kill an animal, whether for pleasure or for food, he should have the responsibility, both legally and morally, to do it in the most humane way.

Obviously, arrows can strike an animal in a non-lethal position, and there is plenty of evidence to show that these arrows are carried by the animals for a considerable length of time. Often the animal will finally die from poison or other long term effects from the wound. In the meantime, the animals suffer to a greater or lesser degree.

I recommend that residents of this area post No Hunting signs

on their property, and demand that the Municipality refuse to sanction an open deer season. You cannot balance nature with a bow and arrow. Surely we must realize the futility of killing for pleasure, especially when such an inhumane method is used.

I cannot help feeling that anyone who enjoys dressing up as a would-be Robin Hood, and shooting animals with a bow and arrow, must be extremely immature. As an alternative, therefore, to bow and arrow hunting in Dufferin County, may I recommend an afternoon at the children's playground at Ontario Place.

## Stamp To Honour Prairie Settlers

OTTAWA - Postmaster General Andre Ouellet today announced the August 28 issue of a multicultural series stamp, paying tribute to the ethnic groups who first settled the prairies a century ago.

"It's appropriate that we issue this eight cent stamp now," Mr. Ouellet said. "1974 marks the one hundredth anniversary of the arrival of Mennonites in Manitoba."

"We are proud of the contributions of many ethnic groups to Canada's multicultural heritage," Mr. Ouellet added.

The province of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta have especially enjoyed the influence of many cultures. To mark the issue in the heart of Canada's ethnic communities, Mr. Ouellet will speak at a stamp launch ceremony in Steinbach, Manitoba on August 28.

The eight-cent stamp issue commemorating the contribution of Canada's ethnic groups to the growth of the

prairie provinces features a group of men, women and children in the left foreground, with a sod hut and farm animals in the background.

A total of 28,000,000 is being printed in four-colour lithography by Ashton - Potter Limited of Toronto. Marginal inscriptions, including the designer's name, appear on the four corners of each pane of fifty stamps available from the Philatelic Service.

The total production of these stamps bears the "General Tagging." These stamps will not be available in any other form.

Mint stamps are available to collectors through Philatelic Counters at selected post offices across Canada, as well as by mail order through the Philatelic Service, Canada Post Office, Ottawa, Ontario KIA 0B5
