Selkirk Firemen were called out Friday afternoon to help put out the fire at Laurie's Scrap and Metal Yard near Hagersville.

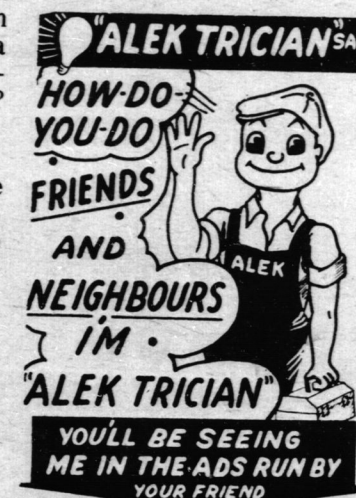
Howard and Bev Bassindale and family spent a couple of days last week camping at Niagara Falls with Bev's parents.
